### NEWS FROM THE COUCH

#### Gang Prevention

Young people join gangs for various reasons. Some are motivated by the fun, social action, parties, hanging out, drugs, music, and the opportunity to socialize with members of the opposite sex. Others join for the opportunity to make money. Some youth associate with a gang for the protection it affords or because they have friends, family, or significant others in the gang.

A number of risk factors make children more likely to join gangs. Youth who are delinquent and involved in violence, drug and alcohol abuse, and promiscuous sexual activity have a higher incidence of gang membership. Children who do poorly in school, are bullied or susceptible to peer pressure, and have certain mental health problems such as depression, hyperactivity or conduct disorder may also be more likely to join a gang. Youth who lack a stable family structure, have little supervision, and are not affirmed and protected by caregivers are also at risk.

Some early warning signs that a child may be involved in gang activity are: disrespecting authority, changing friends, truancy, losing interest in school and family, using drugs or alcohol, getting arrested or detained by the police, and having unexplained cash and goods. Caregivers should also check for gang symbols or graffiti and inspect clothing for forms of gang communication, such as wearing gang colors or wearing a hat tilted to one side.

Waiting until a youth is already involved in a gang is not advised. The best prevention of criminal and gang involvement begins early in life. Spend time with each of your children to help them feel that they are an important part of the family, supervise their activities and get to know their friends, get them involved in extracurricular activities so they can feel a sense of belonging, and talk to your children about your values and the dangers of gangs. The more caregivers provide children with support

and an emotional connection, establish strong parenting practices, and increase involvement in schools, churches, and their communities, the more resilient your children will be to the pressures of joining a gang.

If you suspect your child is associating with a gang, seek professional help. Counseling can help uncover reasons why your child joined a gang and work to restore family bonds. The Hanover Park Police Department sponsors the Safe Home Program, an intervention program designed to identify potential gang membership, educate caregivers as to the warning signs of gang involvement, and provide families with resources. #### April is National Distracted Driving Awareness Month



- In Illinois, nearly 6,000 crashes occurred from 2008 to 2012 in which some form of driver distraction involving a cell phone was cited by police. Of those, 30 were fatal.
- In 2012, cell phone distractions were the primary or secondary cause of more than 1,200 crashes in Illinois.
- Drivers using hand-held phones are four times more likely to get into an accident causing injuries.
- At any given time of day, about 800,000 drivers are using a hand-held phone while driving.
- Cell phone conversations are involved in 12 times as many crashes as texting.
- About 1.3 million crashes nationwide, or 23% of the annual total, involve drivers using cell phones.
- More than 3,300 fatalities a year, about 10% of all traffic deaths, occur nationally as a result of distracted driving.
- About 21% of teenage drivers who were involved in fatal crashes were distracted by cell phone use when the crash occurred.
- Distracted driving is the lead cause of fatal crashes among teens.
- Sending or receiving a text at 55 mph is the equivalent of driving the length of a football field blind.

Illinois is the 12th state to ban the use of hand-held devices while driving, banning hand-held cell phone use, except in an emergency, allowing only for speakerphones and headsets that feature voice-activated or one-digit dialing. The new law also imposes fees starting at \$75 for drivers caught using a hand-held cell phone while driving. (Drivers could pay \$150 for repeat offenses and may eventually have their driver's license(s) suspended.)

This law also imposes stricter penalties following crashes in which electronic devices were being used at the time of collision. A crash causing great bodily harm can earn a driver up to one year in prison, and a fatal crash can result in a prison sentence of up to three years.

## Public Works - 2014 Brush Pick Up Program

The Brush Pick Up Program provides FREE curbside pickup and chipping of branches, which are then reused as mulch. Last year, the program produced mulch which was made available FREE to Village residents for use around shrubs and flower beds. Brush will be picked up in April, July, and October.

### What will be picked up:

Branches with a minimum of two (2) feet in length and a maximum of ten (10) feet in length and less than eight (8) inches in diameter.

### What will not be picked up:

Small hedge or pine clippings; Yard waste or brush in containers; Brush or branches with thorns; Stumps or tree roots.

### How to stack brush:


Neatly stack the brush in one direction with the butt end toward the street; No lumber, wire, rope or other material may be included with the brush; Do not block the sidewalk when putting brush out.

### Set Out Time:

Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 a.m. of your scheduled pick up period. Do not put brush out after 7:00 a.m. on the first day of the collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pick up. The Village incurs considerable cost returning to an area to collect brush set out after the first day of the collection cycle. **Curbside yard waste collection is provided by Allied Waste Services once a week on Fridays beginning April 4, 2014 through November 29, 2014. Yard waste stickers are required for curbside pickup.**

### Annual Spring Hydrant Flushing

Beginning Monday, May 5<sup>th</sup> and continuing through Friday, May 16<sup>th</sup>, the Village Water Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. Flushing will occur between 6:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Notices will be posted in designated areas prior to flushing.

Residents should not wash laundry during the flushing hours, as rust staining of clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

### Hydrants will be flushed by area according to the following schedule:

#### Cook County

- May 5, 6, 7 - South of Irving Park Road, north of Lake Street, west of Barrington Road
- May 8, 9 - South of Irving Park Road east of Barrington Road (Hanover Highlands and Longmeadows South area)
- May 12, 13, 14, 15 - North of Irving Park Road

#### DuPage County

- May 5, 6, 7, 8 - South of DuPage County Line, North of Stearns Road
- May 9, 12 - South of Stearns Road, North of Schick Road
- May 13, 14, 15, 16 - South of Schick Road

- Be open to the general public;
- Service a public or mutual benefit other than the pursuit of accumulation of profits for its owners or investors; and,
- Meet the approval of the Village Editorial Board.
