



# Police Department



## School Parking and Cell Phone Usage

In an effort to keep our children safe, please use extra caution when driving through school zones. School zones are marked areas around

schools where children often board buses or cross a roadway. Remember to reduce your speed and obey the speed limit in school zones.

Parents should pay extra attention to parking signs in the area of schools and ensure that their vehicles are properly parked and not in violation of any parking restrictions.

Drivers are prohibited from using cellular phones while driving on the roadway in a school zone. The Hanover Park Police Department encourages all drivers to put the cell phone away and pay extra attention when driving through school zones.



## Resident WINTER PARKING Regulations



### NO PARKING on Village streets after TWO inch snowfall

*62-11-1323. Limited parking for snow removal. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on any public street in the Village at any time within 24 hours after a snowfall of two inches or more has occurred, except on those streets where late night parking is permitted in Section 62-11-1327 (b), that within 24 hours after a snowfall of two or more inches vehicles shall be parked only on the side of the street on the day during which late night parking is permitted.*

## Vehicles left running. . . and unattended

With winter coming, it's typical for one to warm up their vehicle and leave it unattended. Most vehicle thefts that occur within the Village are crimes of opportunity where the victim leaves their vehicle running and unattended while they run in for that cup of coffee at the convenience store, or simply leave it unattended in their driveway to warm up. Help us lower crime rates and protect your investment by staying with your car while it warms up, or turning it off at the convenience stores and securing it.



*(625 ILCS 5/11-1401) (from Ch. 95 1/2, par. 11-1401) Sec. 11-1401. Unattended motor vehicles. No person driving or in charge of a motor vehicle shall permit it to stand unattended without first stopping the engine, locking the ignition, removing the key from the ignition, effectively setting the brake thereon and, when standing upon any perceptible grade, turning the front wheels to the curb or side of the highway.*

## Emerald Ash Borer Update

The Village is starting to see the effects of the Emerald Ash Borer throughout the Village.



Overall, the Village had 3,300 Ash trees in parkways and to date, 338 of these have been removed. However, due to financial constraints, the Village has not been able to fund replacement trees at this time. We will allow residents to plant a tree in the parkway at their own expense.

## Code Enforcement/Public Works Holiday Lights Reminder:

**P**ursuant to Village Code 30-1(590.3B) holiday lights must be taken down within 90 days of the holiday. Christmas lights must be down by April 1<sup>st</sup>.

**R**ecycle your old holiday lights and extension cords at the Public Works Department between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday thru February 28<sup>th</sup>.

## Holiday Trash Pick Up Schedule

Due to the approaching holidays, residential refuse pick up will be collected according to the following schedule:

- **Thanksgiving** Saturday, November 24<sup>th</sup>
- **Christmas** Saturday, December 29<sup>th</sup>
- **New Years** Saturday, January 5<sup>th</sup>

Final curbside yard waste collection will be Friday, November 30<sup>th</sup>.

## Christmas trees will be recycled

Throughout the Village on Saturday, January 5<sup>th</sup> and Friday, January 11<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. Place your Christmas tree in the parkway and follow these guidelines:

- Do not put trees in plastic bags.
- Remove the stand and all decorations including lights, garland, tinsel, and metal (such as nails).
- Dispose of artificial or natural wreaths in the regular household garbage.
- Do not place artificial trees at the curb for recycling.

Set your tree out on the above dates. However, if you miss the special collection dates, Allied Waste Services will collect Christmas trees with your regular garbage and refuse collection.

This service will be provided to the homeowners associations not regularly serviced by Allied Waste Services.

## Fire Department - Fireplace Safety

Keep your family safe and warm by using these fireplace safety tips:

**Have your chimney or wood stove inspected** and cleaned annually by a certified chimney specialist. This reduces the risk of fires and carbon monoxide poisonings due to creosote buildup or obstructions in the chimney. To locate a certified chimney specialist visit the CSIA website at [www.csia.org](http://www.csia.org) or your local telephone directory.

**Install a chimney cap** to keep debris and animals out of the chimney. Remove branches at least 15 feet away from the top of the chimney.



**Choose the right fuel.** Choose well-seasoned wood that has been split for a minimum of six months to one year and stored in a covered and elevated location. Please never burn Christmas trees, treated wood or construction debris in your fireplace. This material can cause damage that could later result in a chimney fire or a fire that extends into your home.

**Keep the hearth and area around the fireplace clear.** Combustible material, such as furniture or seasonal decorations, too close to the fireplace could easily catch fire.

**Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.** Place detectors throughout the house and check batteries in the spring and fall. When you change your clocks for Daylight Savings Time, remember to check your batteries.

**Never leave a fire unattended.** Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house. Soak hot ashes in water and place them in a metal container outside your home.

**D**aylight Savings Time ends Sunday, November 4<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 a.m. Please remember to set your clocks back one hour and change the batteries of your inside smoke alarms.

# Fire Department Holiday Season Information

## Keep the Wreath Red Program

“Keep the Wreath Red” is a holiday fire safety program designed to increase fire safety awareness. In the event of a holiday-related fire, firefighters will replace one of the red bulbs with a white one. The goal is to keep the bulbs on the wreath red.

This program is a constant reminder for citizens to use proper care when creating holiday displays that include lights, electrical cords, candles, Christmas trees and other decorations.



Check your smoke detectors and make sure they are in good working order. Change the batteries when you change your clocks from Daylight Savings Time, Sunday, November 4<sup>th</sup> (Set clocks back one hour.)

## Holiday Safety Tips

**Trees:** Before purchasing a fresh Christmas tree remember that a fresh tree is green and the needles are hard to pull from branches. When bent between your fingers, fresh needles do not break. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin. When you bring a tree home, cut about an inch off the end of the trunk. This will remove the dried end and allow the tree to absorb water. Trim away branches as necessary to set tree trunk in a sturdy, water-holding stand with wide-spread feet. Place trees away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources. Heated rooms dry out trees rapidly creating fire hazards. Always keep the water tray full so the tree stays

moist. Christmas trees that are not kept moist can present a very serious fire hazard. When the tree becomes brittle, discontinue using the lights. If you buy an artificial tree, look for a statement specifying fire resistant protection.



Place the tree out of the way of traffic, and do not block doorways. Make sure that the tree is secured against accidental tipping by children or pets.

**Trimming the Tree:** Purchase tinsel or artificial icicles of a non-leaded material. Leaded materials may be hazardous if eaten by children or pets. Avoid any decorations that tend to break easily or have sharp edges. Keep tree trimmings that are small or have removable parts out of the reach of your child; these pieces may be swallowed.

**Lights:** Always turn off lights on trees and other decorations when you go to bed or leave your home. A short circuit in any of this equipment could cause a fire. Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. Use only lights that have been tested by Underwriters Laboratories (UL label) or another reputable testing agency. Check each set of lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires or loose connections. Never use indoor lights outside. Keep children away from light sets and electrical decorations. All lights present the problem of shock and casualty hazards for curious kids. When you are stringing the lights on your tree, be careful how you place them. Lights in windows can cause curtains and drapes to ignite. Outside cords should be approved for exterior uses and inside cords should not be placed under carpets or throw rugs.

**Candles:** Keep candles a safe distance from other items in your home. Candles should be kept out of reach of children. Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Keep candles away from decorations and wrapping paper and place candles where they cannot be knocked over.



**Paper:** Dispose of gift wrappings soon after opening presents. A room full of paper lying around on the floor is just one more holiday hazard. Do not burn wrappings in the fireplace.

**Holiday Plants:** Holly and mistletoe can be fatal to small child. Poinsettia leaves are not fatal if swallowed, but can cause a skin rash and an upset stomach. Call 9-1-1 if your child ingests any of these holiday plants.

# Community Development



This October, the Mayor, Village Manager, and Village Planner attended the annual ICSC (International Council of Shopping Centers) Chicago Deal Making Conference. They met with developers, retailers, and local property owners to promote development opportunities in Hanover Park and gain feedback on Village plans.

Key areas of focus included the northwest corner of Lake Street and Barrington Road and the ‘old Menard’s’ site at Irving Park and Wise Roads. The northwest side of Lake and Barrington has great potential and its development will be the first step in developing the long-term Village Center Plan. Staff is also working with the owner of the old Menard’s to recruit developers and is establishing a Tax Increment Finance (TIF) district in the area, which will serve as a tool to incentivize redevelopment.

In Hanover Park, two new projects are being planned around the intersection of Barrington and Irving Park Roads. A new Tony’s Finer Foods plans to open in the former Ultra Foods space in the Westview Shopping Center this winter, and a new Discount Tire was approved to locate in the vacant lot in front of Menard’s along Irving Park Road. We are excited about the jobs, services, and improved streetscape that these new businesses will provide!

On October 24th, a Ribbon Cutting was held in front of the Village entry sign celebrating completion of the streetscaping project along Barrington Road in front of the Westview Shopping Center.



## Finance Department:

### Municipal Electric Aggregation Results Are In!

The Village of Hanover Park's Municipal Electric Aggregation Program has been fully implemented throughout the

Village and the results are in! The Village bargained a 4.53 cent per kWh rate for electricity for its residents, compared with a ComEd rate of 8.36 cents per kWh. The difference comes to a 46% cost savings on the supply of electricity. The average annualized single-family household savings is estimated at \$333 for this upcoming year. Village-wide, the savings, based on the number of accounts currently enrolled, is estimated at \$2,790,000 per year. There was a 98% participation rate in the program as only 2% of the eligible resident and small commercial electric accounts within the Village of Hanover Park opted out of the program. The conversion started in late August, 2012 with the first savings being reflected on the electric bills received in early October, 2012. The Village of Hanover Park is proud to make this announcement as it is a direct savings to residents personal finances.



The Village has been receiving questions regarding what company the bill comes from, who should be called for an outage and what is ComEd's role now that the Village uses FirstEnergy Solutions, Inc. as the supplier of electricity. Supplying electricity is the only role FirstEnergy Solutions, Inc. has. ComEd remains responsible for all other areas including billing inquiries and power outages.
