Longmeadow Lane Bridge

Take a Stroll

On September 11th, the Mayor and Board of Trustees cut the ribbon on the newly constructed Longmeadow Lane box culvert. This culvert replaces the original bridge which was constructed in 1965. The \$567,200 project was funded by the Federal Highway Administration Bridge Replacement and Rehabilitation Program after the bridge was found to be deficient to daily traffic. The twin box culvert, raised to an elevation to allow a 100 year flood to pass underneath the roadway, was designed by Pavia-Marting & Co of Roselle, IL and constructed by D Construction of Coal City, IL.

How to Overcome the “Holiday Blues”

Many people look forward to the holiday season as a time of happiness, good cheer, fellowship with loved ones and optimistic hopes for the coming year. Yet often our anticipation and excitement can turn into feelings of depression, commonly called the “holiday blues.” Mood changes and anxiety may occur because of the stressfulness of holiday events, the demands placed on our time, and the extra financial burden. Overdrinking, overeating, and fatigue may also cause it.

There are several things that can help make it easier to manage the holiday blues:

- * Be reasonable with your schedule. Don’t overbook yourself into a state of exhaustion.
- * Minimize financial stressors - set a budget and stick to it.

- * Don’t obsess about recreating the holidays of your childhood. Create new holiday traditions.

NEW LAW REGARDING HANDICAPPED PARKING PLACARDS

Beginning January 1, 2014 changes regarding handicapped parking placards will take effect. The primary change is that only persons with specific types of disabilities will be exempt from paying parking meter fees. These individuals will be issued a yellow and gray striped Metered-Exempt Parking Placard. Any person not displaying this particular placard will be required to pay for metered parking regardless of whether they have a temporary or permanent parking placard.



The Metered-Exempt Parking Placard can only be issued by the Secretary of State’s Office. These changes will require the Secretary of State to recertify all current holders of disability license plates and parking placards and re-issue new credentials to ensure that those who qualify for metered-exempt parking receive the appropriate placard.

This process is currently ongoing and enforcement will begin on January 1, 2014.

WINTER PARKING Regulations NO PARKING on Village streets after TWO inch snowfall

62-11-1323. Limited parking for snow removal. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on any public street in the Village at any time within 24 hours after a snowfall of two inches or more has occurred, except on those streets where late night parking is permitted in Section 62-11-1327(b), that within 24 hours after a snowfall of two or more inches vehicles shall be parked only on the side of the street on the day during which late night parking is permitted.

FEMA Updates Mobile App

FEMA recently updated their mobile application, which is available for download by users of wireless communication devices of Android, Apple and Blackberry devices. The mobile app already offers tips on disaster preparedness, an interactive emergency kit checklist and opportunities on how the general public can get involved with disaster preparedness and disaster response support.

As a response to public feedback, FEMA is expanding its use of social networking and crowdsourcing tools. To better serve the nation, the mobile app now includes a feature called Disaster Reporter that allows wireless users to upload pictures and information about disasters in their area and have them posted, after being reviewed, to an online, publicly accessible map. This digital application allows disaster response professionals and support agencies, as well as the general public, the ability to upload critical information to a central location for use in managing a disaster event.

"Crime Free Multi-Housing Program Initiative Comes to Hanover Park"

The Village Board approved a Crime Free Multi-Housing Program as part of recommended updates to the existing "Rental Residential Housing Code" ordinance. Prior to obtaining a rental license in the Village, owners of rental property must attend an educational training seminar and use a Crime Free Lease Addendum, which shall give the landlords the authority to initiate an eviction proceeding, as specified in the Illinois Compiled Statutes Forcible Entry and Detainer statutes.

The overall goal of the Crime Free Multi-Housing Program is to build a cooperative effort between property owners/management, tenants and the police department in keeping illegal and nuisance activity out of rental property. The program takes a pro-active approach to crime prevention, rather than a reactive approach. Although crime will not be entirely eliminated, Crime Free Multi-Housing participants quickly make it known that their rental community will not tolerate criminal behavior on the part of its residents, their guests or others, as they seek to create a crime free environment.

In communities where adopted, this Program achieved almost instant success wherever it was introduced. In rental properties with the highest crime rates, the immediate results showed up to a 90% reduction in police calls for service. Even in the best properties, reductions of 15-20% were not uncommon. Keep the Wreath Red Program

"Keep the Wreath Red" is a holiday fire safety program designed to increase fire safety awareness. In the event of a holiday-related fire, firefighters will replace one of the red bulbs with a white one. The goal is to keep the bulbs on the wreath red.



Holiday Safety Tips

Trees: A fresh Christmas tree is green and the needles are hard to pull from branches. When bent between your fingers, fresh needles do not break. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin. Set the tree trunk in a sturdy, water-holding stand with wide spread feet. Keep trees away from fireplaces, radiators, other heat sources, doorways and foot traffic. Always keep the water tray full so the tree stays moist. When the tree becomes brittle, discontinue using the lights.

Decorating the Tree: Purchase tinsel or artificial icicles of a non-leaded material. Avoid decorations that break easily or have sharp edges. Keep decorations that are small or have removable parts out of the reach of your child; as pieces can be harmful if swallowed.

Lights: Always turn off lights on trees and other decorations when you go to bed or leave your home. Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. Use only lights that have been tested by Underwriters Laboratories (UL label) or another reputable testing agency. Check each set of lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires or loose connections. Never use indoor lights outside. Keep children away from light sets and electrical decorations. Lights in windows can cause curtains and drapes to ignite. Outside cords should be approved for exterior uses and inside cords should not be placed under carpets or throw rugs.

Candles: Keep candles a safe distance from other items in your home and out of reach of children. Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Keep candles away from decorations and wrapping paper and place candles where they cannot be knocked over.

Paper: Dispose of gift wrappings. A room full of paper lying around on the floor is just one more holiday hazard. Do not burn wrappings in the fireplace.

Holiday Plants: Holly and mistletoe can be fatal to small child. Call 9-1-1 if your child ingests any of these holiday plants.

Effective January 1, 2014, the Village’s water and sewer rates will change as part of the four-year rate adjustment approved on March 1, 2012. The \$25.00 service/infrastructure fee that replaced the 12,000 gallon minimum bill will remain in place to ensure all residents pay an equal amount to help recover the costs of infrastructure replacement, repairs and overhead associated with supplying water. Some of the Village’s water and sewer infrastructure are over 50 years old and in need of replacement. Seniors who were exempt from the minimum bill will be exempt from the service charge. Residents enrolled in the Illinois Benefit Access Program (formerly known as Circuit Breaker Program) can apply for an exemption from the service charge.

On January 1, 2014, the Village’s water rate will increase from \$7.07 to \$8.13 for each 1,000 gallons of water used. The City of Chicago, which supplies the Village with water, set a four-year rate increase starting in 2012 of 25%, and an additional 15% each year for 2013, 2014 and 2015. The new sewer rate for Cook County residents is \$2.01 for each 1,000 gallons of water used, and the new sewer rate for DuPage County residents is \$5.41 for each 1,000 gallons used. These were increased by 2% to cover the costs of inflation. Cook County residents’ sewer rates are lower, as they pay an additional sewer charge on their real estate tax bills to the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District, while DuPage County residents submit their entire payment to the Village, which provides their complete sewer service. Public Works Environmental Committee installs a Rain Garden

The Environmental Committee installed a rain garden at the Village Well House located at Longmeadow Lane and Walnut Avenue. A rain garden is a shallow, constructed depression that is planted with deep-rooted native plants and grasses. It is located in your landscape to receive runoff from hard surfaces such as a roof, a sidewalk, or a driveway. Rain gardens slow down the rush of water from these hard surfaces, holds the water for a short period of time, and allows it to naturally infiltrate into the ground.

A rain garden can be thought of as a personal water quality system because it filters the runoff from your roof and lawn, and recharges the groundwater. Rain gardens conserve municipal water resources by reducing the need for irrigation, and are a beautiful and colorful way for homeowners, businesses and municipalities to help ease storm water problems.

Christmas trees will be recycled throughout the Village on Saturday, January 4th and Friday, January 10th, 17th and 24th. Place your Christmas tree in the parkway and follow these guidelines:

- Do not put trees in plastic bags.
- Remove the stand, decorations, lights, garland, tinsel, and metal (such as nails).
- Dispose of artificial or natural wreaths in regular household garbage.
- Do not place artificial trees at the curb for recycling.
- Set your tree out on the above dates. If you miss the special collection dates, Allied Waste Services will collect Christmas trees with your regular garbage and refuse collection.

This service is provided to homeowners associations not regularly serviced by Allied Waste Services.


Community & Economic Development

Village Tree Update



The Village continues to remove infected Ash trees throughout the Village, with an additional 500 to 600 trees removed by Village staff and by a contractor this year. This year's budget had \$20,000 available, and with a \$20,000 grant, the Board approved a contract to plant 183 trees.

The Village Board saw a need to kick start the replanting of the parkway trees and directed staff to go out to bid for an additional \$53,000 worth of trees to be planted in the spring. They are using funds that were originally earmarked

for improvements to the Municipal Building, including the Board dais.

In keeping with the Village goal to have no more than 10 percent of any species of tree in the Village, the tree planting project is requesting prices on 20 varieties of trees. The trees will be planted throughout the Village in the order that Ash trees were removed, with the first trees going to locations where trees were removed over three years ago. The Village will continue removing and replacing over 3,300 parkway Ash trees at a five-year cost in excess of \$1,500,000.

A Bit of Hanover Park History Hanover Highlands

In 1962 the Village Board approved a plat of subdivision for Hanover Highlands. Six model homes were built south of Walnut Avenue on Valley View Drive. Basic home prices, before options, ranged from \$14,995 to \$19,995.

Interest rates for a conventional 24 year mortgage started at 6¼% with 20% down for a monthly payment of \$94.00, including taxes and insurance. A 29 year mortgage started at 6½% interest with 3¼% down for a monthly payment of \$117.50, including taxes and insurance.

When completed Hanover Highland was home to 370 families and a new school, Hanover Highlands Elementary School.
