Traffic Flowing Smoothly on Lake Street; Traffic Signal, Landscaping This Spring

The backhoes and cement mixers are a thing of the past on Lake Street. But the result of their work is an everyday joy -- six freely flowing lanes of traffic. The final pieces of the Lake Street reconstruction project will take place this spring and summer, but, thankfully, they will involve minimal disruptions in traffic patterns.

Traffic lights, landscaping


The Illinois Department of Transportation will be installing a traffic light at Center Avenue and Lake Street. New streetlights, parkway trees and sod will provide the finishing touches. All work is expected to be completed by early summer.

Municipal Complex parking lot reconfiguration

The temporary entrances to the Municipal Complex will be paved later this spring. The parking lot will be reconfigured for better traffic flow. The traffic signal being installed at Center Avenue will make it easier and safer to enter and exit the Municipal Complex parking lot. This work is scheduled to be underway by May and completed by July.

Median landscaping

The Lake Street reconstruction project also included the addition of non-mountable medians. These medians, as well as the corners of Center Street, Church Street, County Farm Road, Triangle Park (corner of County Farm Road and Lake Street), and the Municipal complex entrance will all be landscaped in the fall.

Minute with the Mayor . . .

Every 45 seconds someone in America has a stroke. Annually, approximately 700,000 people will experience one. Stroke is the Number 3 killer and a leading cause of severe, long term disability.

A stroke occurs when a blood vessel that brings oxygen and nutrients to the brain bursts or is clogged. Due to the blockage or rupture, part of the brain does not receive necessary blood and oxygen. Nerve cells in the affected area can't work and die in minutes. When these cells can no longer work, the part of the body they control can't work either.

Are you at risk? Risk factors include:

High Blood Pressure - usually has no specific symptoms and no early warning signs. That's why it's important to have your blood pressure checked regularly.

Cigarette Smoking - nicotine and carbon monoxide in tobacco smoke reduces the amount of oxygen in the blood, damages blood vessel walls and increases the likelihood of clot formation.

Diabetes - while diabetes is treatable, having it increases a person's risk of stroke.

High Cholesterol - elevated levels can cause cholesterol to build up on the walls of arteries. Narrowed arteries increase the risk of blockage, causing a heart attack or stroke.

Physical Inactivity and Obesity - being inactive, obese, or both can increase your risk of high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, heart disease and stroke.

Other types of Heart Disease - people with heart failure or coronary heart disease increase the chances of having a stroke by more than twice the average person.

Excessive Alcohol Intake - drinking alcohol can raise a person's blood pressure, cause heart failure and lead to stroke.

Make sure you are aware of the warning signs so you can take action immediately. An easy way to remember the signs/symptoms of a stroke is to remember: **F A S T**

- F** Weakness or numbness on one side of the face, headaches, trouble seeing with both eyes.
- A** Weakness or numbness of arm or leg on one side of the body, trouble walking.
- S** Sudden trouble speaking, confusion
- T** Time...act quickly to get the person to the hospital. You only have three hours from the start of symptoms to get treatment

It is extremely important you go to the hospital right away. The most common kind of stroke can be treated VERY effectively (you may not have any effect of a stroke at all) if you get treatment in less than three hours from the time symptoms start!





Hanover Park Records Lowest Crime Rate in Village's History in 2004

Hanover Park's crime rate dropped by 17% in 2004, the largest decrease ever recorded since the Police Department began compiling statistics for the FBI. The decrease was in Part 1 crimes, including murder, criminal sexual assault, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The decrease represents a drop of 150 crimes in this category.

Not only is this drop in the crime rate good news for residents, it also is an effective tool for the Police Department in assessing the effectiveness of its programs to combat crime, as well as to target specific areas where crimes are more prevalent.

28 Village Streets Scheduled for Resurfacing

The Village of Hanover Park will be resurfacing 28 streets throughout the Village this spring.

The work will be initiated in May and will consist of grinding approximately 2 inches of existing asphalt off of the 28 streets and replacing with a new 2 inch thick asphalt surface course. Prior to the resurfacing drainage structures will be rebuilt, sections of deteriorated pavement will be patched, and deteriorated sections of curb and gutter will be replaced. It is anticipated that the resurfacing will be completed by the end of June.

Village's Public Works Department Now Hiring Seasonal Employees

The Village has immediate seasonal openings for full-time laborers to work 40 hours per week, 6:00 AM-2:30 PM, Monday thru Friday, in the Public Works Department. Those hired will work from May thru October performing various manual tasks to maintain Village property and/or the repair of roads and drainage structures, and other related work. Candidates for these positions must be able to understand and follow instructions, as well as the ability to perform strenuous work in varying weather conditions.

Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, possess a valid driver's license and steel-toe safety shoes. Hiring is contingent

upon the applicant passing an employee-paid drug screen.

The starting salary is \$8.40 per hour. Wage increases are based upon performance and the ability to meet established goals and objectives. Seasonal employees are not eligible for any benefits other than those required by law.

The selection process will include a review of the candidate's past work experience, a personal interview, and background checks.

Spring Hydrant Flushing Begins May 2

It's that time of year again. Beginning Monday, May 2 and continuing through Friday, May 13, the Village Water Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 6:00 AM and 2:00 PM. Notices will be posted in designated areas prior to flushing.

Residents should not wash laundry during the flushing hours as rust staining of clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Residents often ask why the Village flushes fire hydrants every year. The answer is that regular hydrant flushing is a vital part of routine maintenance for the water system for these important reasons:

- ❑ **Improves water quality:** Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- ❑ **Improves water flow:** By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore allows a better flow of water.
- ❑ **Hydrant maintenance:** A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- ❑ **Hydrant inspection:** Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

DUPAGE COUNTY

May 2, 3, 4, 5

South of Devon Avenue, east of Church Road, west of Arlington Drive East (Greenbrook Area) Fremont and Glens area.

May 6, 9

South of Stearns Road, north of Schick Road

May 10, 11, 12, 13

South of Schick Road to Army Trail Road, east of Bayside Drive to west of Kuhn Road and west of Windjammer Lane.



Ready to Get Rid of the Winter's Accumulation of Brush & Branches? Brush Pickup Resumes April 4

The Village of Hanover Park's annual Brush Pickup Program will take place in April. Listed below are the procedures residents need to follow in order to comply with requirements for the program.

Set-Out Time – 7:00 AM

Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 AM on your pick up day. Please do not put brush out after 7:00 AM on the first day of your collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pickup. The Village incurs considerable cost returning to an area to collect brush set out after the first day of the collection cycle. It may take more than one day to pick up all the brush in a designated area. If brush is not picked up on the first day, it will still be picked up.

Brush Pickup Schedule

April 4th – Area 1:

Streets north of Lake Street and west of Barrington Road.

April 11th – Area 2:

Streets north of Lake Street and east of Barrington Road

April 18th – Area 3:

Streets south of Lake Street and north of Lawrence Avenue

April 25th – Area 4:

Streets south of Lawrence Avenue

What will be picked up:

- Branches a minimum of 2 feet in length and up to a maximum of 10 feet in length, and less than eight inches in diameter.

What will NOT be picked up:

- Small hedge or pine clippings.
- Yard waste or brush in containers.
- Brush or branches with thorns.
- Tree stumps and roots.

How to stack the brush:

- Brush should be stacked in one direction with the butt end toward the street.
- No lumber, wire, rope, or other materials may be included with the brush.
- Brush must NOT block the sidewalk.

BFI Yardwaste Collection Resumes April 1:

BFI resumes regular yardwaste collection on Friday, April 1, 2005. Yardwaste stickers are available at Village Hall in addition to several retail outlets at a cost of \$1.74 per sticker. A yardwaste disposal sticker must be affixed to each Kraft paper yardwaste bag or through the handle of each plastic or metal container left at the curb.

Are you Prepared for Severe Weather?

When most people think of thunderstorms and tornados, they think of summertime, but the truth is that severe weather can occur at any time of the year. By taking a few moments to become familiar with the following recommendations, you and your family will be better protected in the event of severe weather.

No matter where you live or what your level of preparedness is, every household should do at least the following:

- Teach children how and when to call 9-1-1 for emergency assistance.
- Keep important documents and records in a safe deposit box or other secure location away from the home.
- Maintain a disaster supply kit, which includes flashlights, a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio with a battery backup and tone-alert feature (which automatically alerts you when a Watch or Warning is issued), fresh batteries, a change of clothing and shoes, canned food and bottled water, cash or a credit card, a first aid kit and manual, a fire extinguisher, water-proof matches, and a signal flare and whistle. If you have a pet, your kit should also contain a spare ID collar and rabies tag, a leash, pet food and extra water, kitty litter or trash bags for waste, and veterinary records (which are necessary if your pet has to go to a shelter). Mac's Specialty Machine

It's hard to believe by looking at the store today, but Mac's Specialty Machine, Inc., owned by Lee and Joyce McNeil, started out in a rehabbed chicken coop on a farm in Bartlett

The business's loyal customers rave about how fair and honest they are at Mac's. Sales people takes the time to help customers buy the lawn mower or snowblower that's best for them, not necessarily the most expensive one. Mac's is well known for standing behind repairs, and treating customers like family and friends."

Lee was an aircraft mechanic for 24 years, but "All of us at the airline I was working for lost our jobs and our pensions in the recession of the 1980s," Lee recalled. "I couldn't get a job with another airline, so I started working on anything people needed fixed. Sometimes I worked on motor homes in my driveway. My neighbors were pretty tolerant. I worked on a snowblower for someone in my church. He liked my work and helped me get started in business."

That's when Lee and Joyce found the chicken coop on a farm in Bartlett. They insulated it, put in a furnace, and set up shop.

The business kept growing, and soon Lee and Joyce were hiring additional help. Eleven years ago they moved to their current location in Greenbrook Plaza. One of Lee's satisfied customers was Village Manager Marc Hummel. "He was the one who urged me to move the business to Hanover Park" Lee recalled. "The business has come close to tripling since we've been here."

Mac's serves both residential and commercial customers. The clean, carpeted showroom has more than a hundred pieces of equipment including lawn mowers, snow blowers, chippers and commercial lawn mowing equipment.

"We repair anything we sell, as well as most other brands as long as we can get parts for them," Lee said. "We also sell lots of parts. People can buy the parts from us and do the repairs themselves."

What gives Mac's Specialty Machine such a loyal following? "We're friendly and we treat people fairly," Lee said. "We tell people the good and the bad about anything they're thinking about buying."

CONSIDER A CAREER AS A HANOVER PARK POLICE OFFICER

Ever thought about becoming a police officer? The Hanover Park Police Department is holding an orientation for interested applicants on Monday, April 11 at 7:00 PM at Spring Wood Middle School, 5540 Arlington Drive East. The physical agility and written exam will be held on Saturday, May 7 beginning at 8:00 AM at Spring Wood Middle School. Applications are due no later than at the start of orientation on April 11. Application forms are available on the Village's website, www.HanoverParkIllinois.org or from the Village's Human Resources Department, (630) 372-4250.

In order to apply, you must be at least 20 years old, have an associate's degree or 60 semester hours or 90 quarter hours of college credit, a valid driver's license, no felony convictions, be of good moral character, and able to live within a 35 mile radius of Hanover Park within one year of being hired. Bilingual fluency is a plus. Starting pay is \$41,766.

TRAFFIC CRASHES DROP BY 19%

Perhaps it was the result of the deterrent effect of increased police enforcement on the roads, or the "Smart Trailer" that measures the speed of approaching vehicles and displays it on a large sign as the driver passes by. Whatever the reason, the end result was a 19% decrease in traffic crashes in Hanover Park in 2004.

The Police Department increased its patrol on specific roadways in 2004, based on the number of traffic crashes. In addition, the Smart Trailer was set up in high traffic areas or areas where there had been numerous complaints about speeding. In all, the Police Department increased the number of traffic citations written by 24% compared to 2003.

If your holiday decorations are still hanging from the rooftop and adorning the front lawn, this is a friendly reminder that Village ordinance specifies that holiday decorations must be taken down within 90 days following the holiday. Thanks for your cooperation.

PLANING AN OUTDOOR PROJECT THAT REQUIRES ANY TYPE OF DIGGING?

Then plan to call J.U.L.I.E. (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) at 1-800-892-0123 at least two days (excluding Saturdays and Sundays) before you plan to dig. J.U.L.I.E. provides FREE locating and marking of underground utilities. Illinois law requires a call to J.U.L.I.E. prior to digging to prevent the accidental severing of utility lines.

GREENBROOK ELEMENTARY 5TH GRADERS RAISE \$1,400 FOR TSUNAMI VICTIMS
