


New Landscaping Planned For Irving Park Road

As part of an ongoing program to enhance the appearance of Irving Park Road, the Village has retained a landscape design consultant to recommend additional aesthetic improvements.

High visibility areas including roadway intersections and areas along arterial fences are priority sites. The Village is working with CONECT (Committee on Networking, Education and Community Teamwork) subcommittee members Gail Tobin, Tony Mechini and Bill Mingotti, who are representing the businesses along Irving Park Road, to implement a public/private improvement program. The project also includes extension of a public sidewalk from Orchard Lane east to the Schaumburg Village limit.

This year's landscape project is anticipated to be completed during Fall 2006.

Hanover Park Police Department Ranked Eighth in State for DUI Arrests

Again this year, the Hanover Park Police Department has been rated very highly in the annual survey conducted by the Alliance Against Intoxicated Motorists (AAIM). With 380 DUI arrests during the year, Hanover Park ranked eighth out of 400 police agencies for 2005.

DUI reduction is a top priority for the Hanover Park Police Department. In order to help keep intoxicated motorists off of the road, the Police Department held several formal "DUI Saturation Patrols" throughout the year. The patrols are designed to reduce traffic crashes through rigorous and

sustained traffic law enforcement.

In order to help achieve this goal, the "Seizing and Impounding of Motor Vehicles" ordinance was established by the Village Board in February 2004, and then expanded in March 2005. This local legislative tool allows Hanover Park Police Officers to impound vehicles which are driven by people who are arrested for certain criminal traffic offenses; including Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol and/or Drugs. A \$500.00 fine must be paid before vehicle owners are permitted to retrieve their impounded vehicles.

Minute with the Mayor . . .

About a month ago, a friend and former resident of the Village was in town to visit his old neighborhood. He mentioned that as he drove down Barrington Road the night before he noticed the “new church” just north of Walnut Avenue. Rather than tell him what it really was, I suggested to really appreciate this new addition to the Village, he should see it during the day.

The next day he was surprised to learn what he had actually seen was the Irwin A. Bock Fire Station #1 still under construction. While we had hoped to get a few more years out of the smaller, more out-of-date station on Maple Avenue, the extensive amount of maintenance required to keep it going could no longer be justified. It was originally built in 1969 and was not then meant to house firefighters.

The new station has been designed to serve Hanover Park residents for many years to come. It incorporates needed administrative offices, a triage room, conference room, training room, an expanded apparatus floor to accommodate additional firefighting and EMS equipment, and sleeping quarters for up to twelve firefighters.

The Village has already received requests from neighboring fire departments regarding the possibility of renting the new station’s conference and training facilities for their own programs.

New Fencing on Two Portions of Army Trail Road Designed to Buffer Noise, Enhance Appearance of Roadway

Each year the Village completes arterial fence and sidewalk extension programs. This year the arterial fence project is on the north side of Army Trail Road from Woodlake Drive to Bayside Drive and another section on the north side of Army Trail Road from County Farm Road to Marine Drive. The new fence enhances the appearance of the arterial roadway and provides a noise buffer between the busy street and residential homes.

Another public improvement recently completed is a sidewalk on the west side of Bayside Drive from Leeward Lane to Harbor Lane. Pedestrian traffic at Lions Park and the adjoining baseball and soccer fields has increased over the last several years.

The new sidewalk provides access to these recreational areas. Also, the private developer of the new commercial center on Army Trail Road will be continuing the public sidewalk on Bayside Drive from Leeward Lane to Army Trail Road.

In addition, the Hanover Park Police Department recently instituted a full-time Traffic Unit, staffed by a sergeant and two sworn police officers. The Traffic Unit concentrates on addressing specific traffic related issues. This program was created in an effort to increase the safety of both residents and motorists within the Village of Hanover Park.

Pedestrian Crosswalk Coming to Irving Park Road And Kingsbury Drive

Pedestrian traffic has increased dramatically at Irving Park Road and Kingsbury Drive since the new Schaumburg Township Branch Library was completed this spring. As a result, the Village has contacted the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) to request a pedestrian crosswalk at the traffic signal. Based upon an initial approval by the State, which has jurisdictional approval for the road, the Village has engineering work already underway to design the crosswalk and pedestrian signal on the east portion of the intersection.

Construction is anticipated in the next fiscal year.

Procedures to Mediate a Parking Ticket

Residents who find a parking citation on their windshield, and feel that the ticket was given in error, are invited to make use of the Police Department's ticket review procedure. **Please note that the ticket is only eligible for review/mediation PRIOR to the due date written in the upper right hand corner of the citation.** Once the due date has passed, the citation cannot be mediated, and you must request a court date at the Village Clerk's office.

The following steps must be taken in order to mediate a parking ticket:

1. Bring all pertinent documentation (such as a receipt for parking in the commuter lot that would show payment for parking if the citation was for failure to pay the daily fee) and the parking citation to the Police Department.
2. Advise the Clerk that you wish to mediate the parking citation.



3. The Clerk will give you a form to fill out that will include your name, address, citation number, and an area for a written explanation of why the ticket should be reviewed. Be sure to provide a detailed explanation about why you feel the ticket should be dismissed. The officer mediating the ticket will not be the officer who issued the ticket.
4. The Clerk will copy your documentation and the citation and attach it to the mediation request. The ticket due date will then be put on hold until the citation has been reviewed.
5. The ticket and mediation form will be reviewed by the Police Department's Traffic division and one of the following decisions will be made:
 - A. The ticket will be dismissed.
 - B. The ticket will be amended to a warning and the fine suspended.
 - C. The ticket must be paid or you may request a court date. A new due date will be assigned.
6. The decision on the mediation will be mailed to the address listed on the form.
7. If the decision is that the fine must be paid and it is not paid, the ticket may be forwarded for prosecution or forwarded to the Village's collection agency.

Yardwaste Sticker Rate Increased from \$1.81 to \$1.88

Yardwaste, which has been banned from Illinois landfills since July 1990, is picked up at the curb once a week from April through November by Allied Waste Services and transported to an IEPA-approved composting site.

A “user pay” system for yardwaste has been in effect since the July 1990 landscape waste ban. Each resident pays his proportionate share of this additional cost through the purchase of special yardwaste stickers that are required for the yardwaste to be collected. Because costs continue to rise, the price of the stickers increased from \$1.81 to \$1.88, effective July 1, 2006. Even though curbside pick up and composting of yardwaste is an added cost, it is ecologically wise for yardwaste to be kept out of the landfills in order to conserve the quickly-disappearing landfill space.

Preparing yardwaste for pick up:

- Grass and small shrubbery clippings, leaves, hedge trimmings and garden waste may be put out for pick up.
- Place yardwaste in a 35-gallon brown paper yardwaste bag available from your local grocery stores and other merchants, or place it in a 35-gallon or less metal or rigid plastic container.
- A yardwaste disposal sticker **must** be affixed to **each** brown yardwaste bag, plastic or metal container left at the curb. The stickers will be removed from the containers by Allied Waste Services employees as the containers are emptied. Remember to place the containers so the sticker faces the curb. Containers without stickers will not

Outdoor Emergency Sirens: When They are Activated, What They Mean

For the safety of its residents, the Village of Hanover Park maintains an Emergency Alerting System designed to warn of impending danger from severe weather or an attack on the United States. Local television and radio stations also participate in the Emergency Alerting System. Local broadcasts can be an excellent source of up-to-date information during an emergency.



Outdoor warning sirens have been strategically placed throughout the Village. These warning devices are designed to alert those who are outdoors of impending severe weather or a military attack. In many cases, these warning devices can also be heard by those who are inside a building.

There are two standardized warning signals established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and used by the Village of Hanover Park to alert the public and to indicate survival actions to be taken in an emergency. These signals are the ATTACK WARNING and the ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL.

ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL

An ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL is a three to five minute **wavering siren** tone. The ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL means that an actual attack or missile launch against the United States has been detected and that protective action should be taken immediately. Per federal guidance, "this signal will be used for no other purpose and will have no other meaning."

ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL

An ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL is a three to five minute **steady signal** from sirens. Note: The sirens are mounted atop elevated platforms and rotate in order to be heard in all directions. The ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL will change in volume as the siren rotates toward and away from the listener. This should not be mistaken for the ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL which is a rapidly wavering tone. The ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL indicates to all persons to move to a place of safety and "turn on your radio or television and listen for essential emergency information." The Village of Hanover Park will activate the ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL in the event of any of the following:

- A confirmed sighting of a tornado or funnel cloud aloft, reported by a trained weather spotter, within five miles of any point within the Village of Hanover Park.
- A confirmed sighting, by a trained weather spotter, of severe winds causing structural damage within five miles of any point within the Village of Hanover Park.
- The receipt of a tornado warning, issued by the National Weather Service, indicating that the Village of Hanover Park is in the direct path of an oncoming tornado.

In the event of activation of either of these warning signals, residents should move to a place of safety and monitor radio and television stations for additional information, including when the danger has passed. Please note that there is no siren activation to indicate that the danger has passed.

Next Hanover Park Citizens Police Academy Begins September 11

The Hanover Park Police Department is now taking applications for its annual Citizens Police Academy. Classes will be held at the Hanover Park Police Station every Monday night from 6:30 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. from Monday, September 11 through Monday, October 30. The Citizens Police Academy is designed to give participants a first hand look at the various aspects of police work.

The Citizens Police Academy is an opportunity for citizens to gain insight into the duties of police officers, while providing responsible citizens with comprehensive knowledge of police operations, practices and objectives. Participants in the Academy learn how they can help keep the community crime free and become resources for improved community/police involvement.

Participants will gain in-depth knowledge about the criminal justice system, the operational guidelines of police agencies, ways to resist crime, and how to take appropriate security measures. The Academy is taught by Hanover Park Police officers.

Hanover Park residents interested in participating in the Citizens Police Academy must be at least 21 years of age and will need to complete an application form and pass a criminal background check. The Citizens Police Academy will be limited to 20 participants per class and will culminate in a graduation ceremony.

Check These Tips For Helping Your Landscaping Survive the Drought

The Village of Hanover Park reminds residents that extreme heat and drought conditions are stressful on your landscaping. The following recommendations will help keep your landscape healthy and looking its best.

Signs of Drought Stress

- ❑ Upward curling or rolling of leaves
- ❑ Yellowing and browning of leaves, particularly along leaf margin and tips
- ❑ Under-sized leaves; limited shoot growth.
- ❑ Interior needle and leaf drop on conifers and evergreens
- ❑ Iron chlorosis symptoms on foliage (leaf yellowing between veins)



Prioritize Your Plants

Determine which plants are most susceptible to water stress. Below is a rating system for prioritizing the watering needs of typical landscape plants.


High Priority – Trees and shrubs (especially those that are young and planted in an exposed site). Large, mature shade trees and shrubs can be left alone unless the drought is severe and the trees begin to wilt, or the root systems have been recently disturbed.

Medium to High Priority – Perennials, fruit trees and turf that is less than one-year old.

Low Priority – Established turf composed mostly of tall fescue will withstand drought conditions unless they are newly seeded or sodded. Fescue lawns turn brown and become dormant during a drought, but will green-up and grow with a return of cooler, wetter weather.

Watering Wisely During Drought

During a drought, trees should receive the highest priority since it takes years to replace them. Newly transplanted or young trees have a limited root system and need supplemental water even when not experiencing drought conditions. Also, trees growing in a restricted root zone, such as those in landscape strips between sidewalks and streets, also need higher priority.



Methods for watering es include:

- ❑ Deep-root fork or needle, soaker hose, or soft spray wand. Apply water to many locations under the drip line and beyond if possible. Apply 10 gallons of water per inch of a tree's diameter (measured at knee height). For example, a 2-inch diameter tree needs 20 gallons of water. Proper maintenance of trees can help them survive during drought. Don't fertilize trees that are stressed, since fertilizer salts may burn roots when there is not sufficient soil moisture present.
- ❑ Water your landscape according to its needs. Check the soil moisture before you water. One simple way to do this is to insert a 6-inch screwdriver into the soil. If it goes in easily, water is not needed.
- ❑ Water at night. Set sprinklers to water only the landscape and not sidewalks, driveways, or other paved surfaces.
- ❑ Skip watering on days following 1/2 inch or more of rain. On cloudy, cool days plants use less water.
- ❑ Check your sprinklers to determine how much water they place in the landscape. Place shallow containers, such as tuna cans, in various spots under the sprinklers. Measure the water depth in the cans after a specified time period to determine how long you should water.

'No Right Turn on Red' Near New Fire Station Will Allow Ambulances and Fire Trucks to Exit Safely

Hanover Park's elected officials have taken steps to allow fire trucks and ambulances to exit safely from the new Fire Station located at 6850 Barrington Road. A "No Right Turn On Red" Ordinance was approved for westbound traffic on Walnut Avenue at Barrington Road. Vehicles turning north on Barrington Road are no longer allowed to turn right on the red light.



A pre-emption signal located at Fire Station No. 1 will allow fire trucks and ambulances to exit safely. This action will avoid any possible conflict between emergency vehicles leaving the station and vehicles turning on Barrington Road.

Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan Designed to Reduce Loss of Life, Property

The Village of Hanover Park has joined other DuPage County municipalities in preparing a Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan. DuPage County, as other counties in Illinois, is subject to a variety of natural hazards such as floods, tornadoes, earthquakes, and severe summer or winter storms, that can threaten life and health and cause millions of dollars in property damage.

The Natural Hazards Mitigation Plan is designed to reduce the safety and health hazards as well as the property damage caused by natural hazards. The plan has the added benefit of possibly making each of the participating communities eligible for pre- or post-disaster mitigation funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
