



Hanover Park Mourns the Passing of Village President Irwin A. Bock

Village President Irwin "Irv" Bock passed away March 9 after having been hospitalized due to a stroke since early February 2006. Village Officials, employees and residents mourn the loss of their dedicated local government leader.

Mayor Bock had served as Village President since 1997. Previously, he was a three-term Village Trustee having first been elected in 1985. He is remembered for his candid commentary, positive perspective and sustaining support.

In addition to holding the Chief Elected position in Hanover Park, Mayor Bock was extensively involved with intergovernmental agencies. At the time of his death, he was President of the Northwest Municipal Conference, a council of governments representing 50 suburban communities in northwest Cook County. He also was Chairman of the Board of Directors for DUCOMM, a public safety dispatch agency, which provides police and fire communications for numerous DuPage County municipalities. Additionally he was a board member of NSACI, the Northwest Suburban Alliance of Commerce and Industry, and on the Board of the northwest municipal Joint Action Water Agency (JAWA), which supplies Lake Michigan water to Hanover Park and six other communities. In addition, over his 23 year public service career, Mayor Bock served as Vice President of the Illinois Municipal League and was a member of the Metropolitan Mayor's Caucus, and the National League of Cities. He started his public service career as a member of the Village's Zoning Board of Appeals.

Mayor Bock had a special interest and expertise in public safety. He had been a City of Chicago Police Officer and a volunteer firefighter for the Ontarioville Fire Protection District, the predecessor of the Village's Fire Department. He was instrumental in the establishment of the Village Fire Department. As a champion of public safety services, he understood the importance of police and fire first responders.

While at the helm of the Village, numerous public improvement projects or programs were completed. Most recently Lake Street was reconstructed and construction of a new fire station was initiated. Water and wastewater systems were improved. He was an advocate of both residential and commercial growth. His guidance was instrumental in all Village activity.

He is survived by his wife Carol, daughter Cheri, son Jeff, three grandchildren, and his brother Bob. A memory book is available at the Village Hall front lobby for residents and friends to write a remembrance of Irv. Please stop by and share your memories of this man who meant so much to so many.

- ▲ Popeye's Chicken is constructing a new restaurant at 1380 Irving Park Road, at the site of the former Arby's Restaurant, at the corner of Irving Park Road and Kingsbury Lane.
- ▲ Advance Auto Parts has built a new building at 1501 Irving Park Road and is open for business.
- ▲ H2O Auto Spa is the new car wash and detailing facility located at 1325 Irving Park Road and is open for business.

The Village has contracted with 3-D Design Studio for streetscaping design services on Irving Park Road east of Barrington Road. This is the same firm that recently completed the very attractive streetscaping along Lake Street.

East Avenue Reconstruction To Begin in May

East Avenue from Hollywood Avenue to Briarwood Avenue will be totally reconstructed beginning in May. Completion is expected by the end of July. The reconstruction will include widening the road from 27 to 30 feet, as well as new storm sewers, curb and gutter, new driveway aprons, new parkway trees, and new streetlights. The existing water main will be replaced and new fire hydrants installed.

While construction is in progress, traffic will be detoured one block east to Gladiola Avenue.

Total estimated cost of the project is \$400,000-\$500,000.



Planning an outdoor project that requires any type of digging? Then plan to call J.U.L.I.E. (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) at 1-800-892-0123 at least two days (excluding Saturdays and Sundays) before you plan to dig. J.U.L.I.E. provides FREE locating and marking of underground utilities. Illinois law requires a call to J.U.L.I.E. prior to digging to prevent the accidental severing of utility lines.

17 Village Streets Scheduled for Resurfacing

The Village of Hanover Park will be resurfacing 17 streets throughout the Village this spring.

The work will begin in May and will consist of grinding approximately two inches of existing asphalt off of the 17 streets and replacing with a new two inch thick asphalt surface course. Prior to the resurfacing, drainage structures will be rebuilt, sections of deteriorated pavement will be patched, and deteriorated sections of curb and gutter will be replaced. The resurfacing is expected to be completed by the end of June.



- Thermometers
- Medicines
- Mercury-containing items
- Acids
- Insecticides
- Poisons
- Asbestos
- Oil-based paints

Unacceptable items include:

- Latex paint
- Business wastes
- Agricultural wastes
- Regular garbage
- Fire extinguishers
- School wastes
- Explosives
- Ammunition
- Electronics
- Radioactive material
- Fireworks
- Smoke detectors

Spring Hydrant Flushing Begins May 1

It's that time of year again. Beginning Monday, May 1 and continuing through Friday, May 12, the Village Water Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 6:00 AM and 2:00 PM. Notices will be posted in designated areas prior to flushing.

Residents should not wash laundry during the flushing hours as rust staining of clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Residents often ask why the Village flushes fire hydrants every year. The answer is that regular hydrant flushing is a vital part of routine maintenance for the water system for these important reasons:

- ❑ **Improves water quality:** Flushing removes minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
- ❑ **Improves water flow:** By removing these minerals, the inside diameter of a water main is increased and therefore allows a better flow of water.
- ❑ **Hydrant maintenance:** A fire hydrant is a mechanical device. Operation of a hydrant lubricates internal mechanisms and gaskets.
- ❑ **Hydrant inspection:** Any deficiencies are noted and repaired as necessary to insure that each hydrant will perform when needed for an emergency.

Hydrants will be flushed by area according to the following schedule:

South of Irving Park Road, north of Lake Street, west of Barrington Road

May 4, 5

South of Irving Park Road and east of Barrington Road, (Hanover Highlands and Longmeadows South Areas)

May 8, 9, 10, 11

Jensen Boulevard east to Farmstead Lane, north of Irving Park Road to Cynthia Lane and Hastings Lane

DUPAGE COUNTY

May 1, 2, 3, 4

South of Devon Avenue, east of Church Road, west of Arlington Drive East (Greenbrook Area) Fremont and Glens area.

May 5, 8

South of Stearns Road, north of Schick Road

May 9, 10, 11, 12

South of Schick Road to Army Trail Road, east of Bayside Drive to west of Kuhn Road and west of Windjammer Lane.

Brush Pickup Resumes April 3

The Village of Hanover Park's annual Brush Pickup Program will take place in April. Listed below are the procedures residents need to follow in order to comply with requirements for the program.

Set-Out Time – 7:00 AM

Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 AM on your pick up day. Please do not put brush out after 7:00 AM on the first day of your collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pickup. The Village incurs considerable cost returning to an area to collect brush set out after the first day of the collection cycle. It may take more than one day to pick up all the brush in a designated area. If brush is not picked up on the first day, it will still be picked up.

Brush Pickup Schedule

April 3rd – Area 1:

Streets north of Lake Street and west of Barrington Road.

April 10th – Area 2:

Streets north of Lake Street and east of Barrington Road

April 17th – Area 3:

Streets south of Lake Street and north of Lawrence Avenue

April 24th – Area 4:

Streets south of Lawrence Avenue



What will be picked up:

- ❑ Branches a minimum of 2 feet in length and up to a maximum of 10 feet in length, and less than eight inches in diameter.

What will NOT be picked up:

- ❑ Small hedge or pine clippings.
- ❑ Yard waste or brush in containers.
- ❑ Brush or branches with thorns.
- ❑ Tree stumps and roots.

How to stack the brush:

- ❑ Brush should be stacked in one direction with the butt end toward the street.
- ❑ No lumber, wire, rope, or other materials may be included with the brush.
- ❑ Brush must NOT block the sidewalk.

Curbside Yardwaste Collection Resumes April 7:

Allied Waste Services resumes regular yardwaste collection on Friday, April 7, 2006. Yardwaste stickers are available at Village Hall in addition to several retail outlets at a cost of \$1.81 per sticker. A yardwaste disposal sticker must be affixed to each Kraft paper yardwaste bag or through the handle of each plastic or metal container left at the curb.

'ARE YOU READY' Seminar Prepares Residents for Home and Weather Emergencies

Would you know what to do if a fire or severe weather threatened your home? Learn how to be prepared by attending "ARE YOU READY for Home and Weather Emergencies," the first in a series of Public Safety and Awareness seminars offered by the Village of Hanover Park and the Hanover Park Community Emergency Response Team (an all-volunteer team trained to assist Police and Emergency Rescue Personnel).

This free one-hour presentation on April 18 will teach you ways to reduce the risk of fire in your home, as well as show you what to do in case of severe storms or tornados. Topics include escape plans, important items to keep on hand, and who to contact for assistance when disaster strikes. The presentation also includes a Question-and-Answer session, informational handouts, and a brief introduction to C.E.R.T. Remember, a few moments spent preparing for emergencies now can make all the difference later, so plan to attend.

Village's Outdoor Warning Sirens Designed to Alert Residents to an Emergency; Tested First Tuesday of Every Month

The Village of Hanover Park maintains a network of outdoor warning sirens to alert citizens in the event of an emergency. The sirens are designed to be heard by people who are outdoors, as a signal to seek adequate shelter from a threat to their safety. These sirens are strategically located throughout the Village to ensure that a siren can be heard from any outdoor location in the Village.

The outdoor warning system is tested monthly in accordance with State and Federal regulations. During this test, the sirens are activated for a brief period of time on the first Tuesday of each month, shortly after 10:00 AM.

To ensure the safety of Hanover Park residents, the Village maintains a siren monitoring system that exceeds State and Federal requirements. This system tests the ability of each siren to respond to an activation command. The monitoring system checks each siren daily to ensure the siren is operating properly, without actually activating the siren.

In the event that the siren system is activated in an emergency, citizens should seek shelter and monitor their radio or television for further information regarding the emergency. Remember that sirens are not sounded to give an "all clear" signal.

The Village will deliver loads of wood chips, a by-product of the Village's brush pickup program, to residents free of charge. Each load will average about four cubic yards – enough to fill an area six feet by six feet by three feet high (6' x 6' x 3').

The Public Works Department will deliver the wood chips and will dump them in the driveway only. Wood chips will not be dumped on driveway aprons, sidewalks, or lawns. Please stop by the Public Works facility (rear of the building) before ordering to take a look at the wood chips.

A & A Music

Since 1982, the husband and wife team of Don and Anita Komorski have been providing area residents with private lessons on all kinds of instruments, helping local children use their talents and enjoy making music.

A&A Music employs a total of 11 teachers, who teach about 310 students a year. They offer lessons through the Hanover Park Park District, using their own facility and teachers.

"We used to provide lessons at the Park District," Anita said, "but due to room availability we now provide them at our facility at 27W281 Devon. We donate a 10 week schedule to Park District students, allowing them to use our facility and teachers. They usually get a reduced rate rather than the normal fee, but we don't charge anything for it. The Park District collects the fees and we just voluntarily provide the teachers and the space."

The Komorskis love music and take pleasure in passing that enjoyment on to their students.

"Our philosophy is that we want to provide music education for everybody at all levels, young and old. We feel music is a wonderful hobby or profession, and we can provide all levels of expertise. We are not here to make professionals out of every kid who walks through the door -- we want to see kids have a chance to use their talents and enjoy music."

When Don and Anita originally opened their business in 1982, they started out on Salem Road in Schaumburg. They moved to Hassell Road in Hoffman Estates six years later, and in 1995 settled into their current location in Hanover Park. In addition to providing music lessons, Don tunes, conditions and repairs pianos. "We spend a lot of time fixing instruments and making them playable for people, keeping them in tune and working well."

In addition to helping people of all ages enhance their musical talents, the Komorskis also enjoy giving back to the community.



A FRIENDLY REMINDER ABOUT OVERNIGHT PARKING AND PARKING ACROSS SIDEWALKS

The Village of Hanover Park prohibits overnight parking on any designated Village street between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m., every day of the week unless otherwise posted. If you need temporary parking due to emergency or out-of-town guests, call (630) 372-4400 and for permission to park on the street for a limited time.

The Village of Hanover Park restricts the time a vehicle may be parked on any sidewalk to provide for the safe movement of pedestrian traffic. Vehicles may only be parked on any sidewalk between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. every day of the week.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT NOW HIRING SEASONAL EMPLOYEES

The Village has immediate openings for full time seasonal laborers to work 40 hours per week, 6:00 a.m.-2:30 p.m., Monday thru Friday, in the Public Works Department. Those hired will work from May thru August performing various manual tasks to maintain Village property and/or the repair of roads and drainage structures, and other related work.

Candidates for these positions must be able to understand and follow instructions, as well as have the ability to perform strenuous work in varying weather conditions. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, possess a valid driver's license and steel-toe safety shoes. Hiring is contingent on the applicant passing an employee-paid drug screening.

The starting salary is \$8.93 per hour (effective May 1, 2006). Wage increases are based upon performance and the ability to meet established goals and objectives. Seasonal employees are not eligible for any benefits other than those required by law. The selection process will include a review of the candidate's past work experience, a personal interview, and background checks.
