Irving Park Road Corridor Study Recommendations

The mission of the Village is to provide responsive and effective municipal services toward the goal of maintaining a good quality of life for residents and businesses within the community.

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During the summer of 2012, a panel of 11 land use and development professionals toured the Irving Park Road Corridor area and conducted an extensive review. Staff and study participants held one-on-one interviews and four public meetings to reach out to over 150 residents, businesses, and property owners for their feedback.

Final recommendations for the Irving Park Road Corridor Study have been released, outlining ways to improve the area. Recommendations are centered on three goals:

- support existing successful businesses,
- attract new businesses,
- bring more people into the Village to shop

Specific steps for improvement include adding streetscape, reconfiguring parking lots, and facilitating bike and pedestrian access. The Panel also recommended vacant retail areas, such as the area around the old Menard's, be permitted to redevelop into new uses such as recreational, community services, or senior housing. Staff is identifying specific next steps based upon these recommendations.

This study was made possible by a grant from CMAP (Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning) and performed by ULI Chicago (Urban Land Institute).

If any of you are wondering, I won the weight loss challenge with Carol Stream Mayor Frank Saverino. We had a lot of fun while encouraging staffs’ in both towns to join in. My goal to lose more continues in 2014, as I pursue a healthier lifestyle.

January is Stalking Awareness Month

Did You Know?

- 6.6 million people are stalked each year in the United States.
- 1 in 6 women and 1 in 19 men have experienced stalking victimization at some point during their lifetime.
- The majority of victims are stalked by someone they know.
- 66% of female victims and 41% of male victims are stalked by a current or former intimate partner.
- 76% of female intimate partner homicide victims were stalked by their intimate partner.
- 1 in 4 victims report being stalked through the use of some form of technology.

What is Stalking?

In Illinois, a person commits stalking when “knowingly engaging in a course of conduct directed at a specific person, and knowing or should know that this course of conduct would cause a reasonable person to fear for his/her safety or the safety of a third person, or suffer other emotional distress.”

A “course of conduct” means two or more acts in which a defendant follows, monitors, observes, surveils, threatens, or communicates to or about a person, engages in other non-consensual contact, or interferes with or damages a person’s property or pet.

Stalking is a Class 4 felony. A second or subsequent conviction for stalking is a Class 3 felony. 720 ILCS 5/12-7.3

Things Stalkers Do

- Call you repeatedly, including hang-ups.
- Follow you and show up wherever you are.
- Send unwanted gifts, letters, texts, or e-mails.
- Damage your home, car, or other property.
- Monitor your phone calls or computer use.
- Use technology, like hidden cameras or global positioning systems (GPS) to track where you go.
- Drive by or hang out at your home, school or work.
- Threaten to hurt you, your family, friends or pets.
- Find out about you by using public records or on-line search services, hiring investigators, going through your garbage, or contacting friends, family, neighbors, or co-workers.
- Other actions that control, track, or frighten you.

If You’re Stalked You Might:

- Feel fear of what the stalker will do.
- Feel vulnerable, unsafe, and not know who to trust.
- Feel anxious, irritable, impatient, or on edge.
- Feel depressed, hopeless, overwhelmed, tearful, or angry.

- Feel stressed, including having trouble concentrating, sleeping, or remembering things.
- Have eating problems, such as appetite loss, forgetting to eat, or overeating.
- Have flashbacks, disturbing thoughts, feelings or memories.
- Feel confused, frustrated, or isolated because other people don’t understand why you are afraid.

These are common reactions to being stalked. You are not to blame for a stalker’s behavior.

Things You Can Do

Stalking is unpredictable and dangerous, yet you can take steps to increase your safety.

- Report all incidents to police. If you are in immediate danger, call 911.
- Trust your instincts. Don’t downplay the danger. Take threats seriously.
- Don’t communicate with the stalker or respond to attempts to contact you.
- Develop a safety plan. The agencies listed in this newsletter can help you with this.
- Consider getting a Stalking No-Contact Order. Contact a court advocate listed in this newsletter for help.

Safety Planning

- Tell others about the stalking and seek their support. Tell security staff at your job or school and ask them to help watch out for your safety. Get an escort to your car.
- Keep evidence of stalking: save all messages, keep a log of contacts, take photos.
- Ask others to screen your calls or visitors.
- Change your phone number.
- Vary routines, including changing routes driven and places frequented.
- Don’t travel alone and stay in public places.
- Be diligent about protecting your personal information. Password protect all your accounts.

Resident WINTER PARKING Regulations

NO PARKING on Village streets after TWO inch snowfall



62-11-1323. Limited parking for snow removal. It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on any public street in the Village at any time within 24 hours after a snowfall of two inches or more has occurred, except on those streets where late night parking is permitted in Section 62-11-1327 (b), that within 24 hours after a snowfall of two or more inches vehicles shall be parked only on the side of the street on the day during which late night parking is permitted.

Code Enforcement Holiday Lights Reminder:

Pursuant to Village Code 30-1(590.3B) holiday lights must be taken down within 90 days of the holiday. Christmas lights must be down by April 1st.

Fire Department - Winter Safety at Home

Take a few minutes to make sure your home is safe for all ages. Don't forget to keep your sidewalks and driveways clear of ice and snow for your family, arriving guests and friends in your neighborhood.



That's Alarming:

Install smoke detectors on every floor of your home and carbon monoxide

detectors near sleeping areas. If already installed, test them. Replace the batteries twice a year.

Avoid Overload: Check for overloaded extension cords – usage should not exceed the recommended wattage. Cords should not be placed under rugs or heavy furniture, tacked up or coiled while in use.

Childproof: Check your local library or online for complete lists of childproofing suggestions. Areas of particular danger include outlets, appliances, electronics, stairs and windows.

Portable Space Heater: All portable heaters should be placed at least three feet from beds, curtains or anything flammable. Please do not leave them unattended.

Keep Extinguishers Handy:

Place all-purpose fire extinguishers in key locations in your home – the kitchen, bedroom and basement. Be sure to check expiration dates regularly and know how to use them safely.

Create a Safe Exit Plan: Along with alarms and extinguishers, consider an escape ladder if your home

has two floors. Keep emergency numbers and contacts

readily available by the phone. Create an exit plan and practice it so your family can escape in case of a fire. Every good exit plan includes a family meeting place outside the home to ensure everyone is out of the house.

Put Away Medications: Take medications and medical supplies out of your purse, pockets and drawers, and put them in a cabinet with a child safety lock.

Welcome guest: If you have family/friends staying at your house, don't just show them where they will sleep during their stay or where to hang their coat. Show them what to do in case an emergency should occur. Show them two ways out in case everyone needs to evacuate the home. Let them know where your "Family meeting area" is outside of the home. Show them fire extinguisher locations and how to operate them properly.

Safety in the Kitchen:

- Stay in the kitchen while cooking. When leaving the kitchen for even a short time, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that can catch fire — oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains away from your stovetop.
- Teach your kids to stay in the other room when opening the oven. Mark off a "safe zone" with an area rug as well.
- Wear close-fitting or short sleeves.
- Keep pots and pans on the back burners when practical. Turn handles inward (or sideways) so they don't get accidentally bumped.
- Get in the habit of doing a visual sweep to see that the knobs are in the OFF position when you walk away from the oven.

Saturday, January 5th, January 11th and January 18th

Place your Christmas tree in the parkway and follow these guidelines:

- Do not put trees in plastic bags.
- Remove the stand and all decorations including lights, garland, tinsel, and metal (such as nails).
- Dispose of artificial or natural wreaths in the regular household garbage.
- Do not place artificial trees at the curb for recycling.



If you miss the special collection dates, Allied Waste Services will collect Christmas trees with your regular garbage and refuse collection. This service will be provided to the homeowners associations not regularly serviced by Allied Waste Services.

2012 County Farm Road Transit Study Results



The Final Report of the County Farm Road Transit Study shows that a regular bus route along County Farm Road, from Lake Street to the DuPage County Government Center, is not feasible. The report recommends that businesses and residents be made aware of existing transit options such as the PACE van pools and the existing Dial-A-Ride programs.

The Village will be working with neighboring communities to investigate an Enhanced Demand Service - a more user-friendly Dial-A-Ride, where, in concept, one could call for service within an hour as opposed to a day before.

Coyote Facts

Keeping Coyotes at a Distance.

Coyotes are drawn to neighborhoods for two reasons: human

encroachment into coyote habitat and availability of food, water, and shelter. The following steps can help prevent coyotes from being attracted to your home:

- Tightly secure garbage cans and store trash bins inside sheds or garages.
- Put garbage out the morning of pickup, not the night before.
- When composting, use well-secured bins. Don't add dog or cat waste, meat, dairy or eggs.
- Never leave or store pet food outside.
- Keep outdoor grills clean.
- Pick ripe fruit off trees and remove fallen fruit off the ground.
- Keep bird feeders from overflowing.
- Fence vegetable gardens.
- Eliminate artificial water sources.
- Install motion-activated outdoor lighting.
- Fence your property or yard. The fence must be no more than five feet tall with the bottom extending at least three inches below the ground.
- Clean bushes and dense weeds where coyotes may find cover and small animals to feed upon.
- Close off crawl spaces under porches, decks and sheds.

If you Encounter a Coyote. Coyotes usually avoid people, but may become unafraid because of intentional or unintentional feeding. Coyotes must be encouraged to fear people.

- Never feed or attempt to 'tame' a coyote.
- Do not turn your back on or run from a coyote; if approached, make loud noises and make yourself look big.
- If necessary, throw sticks or small stones (to scare, not injure).
- Always keep yourself between a coyote and small children or companion animals.

- Use a powerful water hose or Super Soaker water gun to scare a coyote away.
- If walking where there are coyotes, carry a deterrent such as an air horn, whistle, or walking stick.

Keep Domestic Animals Safe. Although primarily rodent/rabbit eaters and scavengers, coyotes may view cats and small dogs as prey, while larger dogs may be viewed as a threat, particularly during mating.

- Keep pets inside at night.
- Do not allow your pets to roam free.
- Walk your dog on a leash. If your yard is unfenced, use a leash on your property and do not leave your dog unsupervised.
- Spay or neuter your dogs. Coyotes can mate with unsterilized dogs.


