
Village to hold Ceremony - Remembering 9-11 Fallen Police & Firefighters Memorial

Intergovernmental relationships are developing among neighboring towns around Chicago as we seek to improve our transportation needs. The PACE Bus #554, that runs through Hanover Park, will become a full-time operation August 22, 2011. Having public transportation from O’Hare is next, as well as public transportation south to the Government Center in Wheaton along County Farm Road. 

Village Ceremony Remembering 9-11

Please join us as we honor Firefighters and Police Officers who serve our community, those who gave their lives on September 11, 2001, and all those who have died in the line of duty since that tragic day. Every year, approximately 100 Firefighters and 150 Police officers make the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty.

The ceremony will be held on Saturday, September 10, 2011 at 9:00 a.m. at the Hanover Park Fire Station No. 1, 6850 Barrington Road. The Hanover Park Police Department and Fire Department Honor Guards will lower the flags to half-staff and present two wreaths, one dedicated to Firefighters and the other dedicated to Law Enforcement Officers, in remembrance of their fallen brothers and sisters. The ceremony will close with music featuring Tim Hess playing the bagpipes, the Gospelites, and the Allison Wonder Band.



In the event of inclement weather, the ceremony will be moved inside to the apparatus bay.

Inspectional Services Division

As part of a restructure of Village services, the Hanover Park Fire Department is now overseeing the Inspectional Services Division, previously located within the Community Development Department.

The Inspectional Services Division is made up of experienced, certified inspectors responsible for residential and commercial building permits, plan reviews and construction inspections.

Fire Department personnel will continue conducting general life safety inspections and commercial occupancy inspections as part of the Village's business license program. Department personnel check items such as sprinkler and fire alarm systems, emergency lights, exits, and general housekeeping of businesses, schools, churches, and other occupancies within the Village.

The Community Development Department will continue maintaining oversight of all Village planning, zoning and economic development activities.

The goal of this restructure is to maintain compliance with Village fire and building codes.

Please be assured there will be no interruption in inspectional services or emergency fire and EMS services during this transition.

For the children we will have our Kids Combat Challenge. Children will be able to dress up in firefighting bunker gear and experience what it is like to be a firefighter. Plan to come out and join us for a fun filled day.

Work Continues on New Police Headquarters



On September 16, 2010, the Village Board broke ground for the new Police Headquarters to be located at 2011 Lake Street.

Despite the record snowfall totals of last winter, our new Headquarters is on schedule and will be move-in ready sometime in late January or early February of 2012.

Police Chief David Webb is pleased with the progress of the project and is eager for the Police

Department to utilize the improved functionality of the new building to sustain the highest possible level of police service to the community.

Police Department awarded \$361,000 in Grant Monies

The Village had a busy year in applying for and obtaining grants for various projects and programs. Taking advantage of funding offered at the state and federal levels, we have received over \$361,000.00 thus far for fiscal year 2011, with several more grants awaiting approval.

Programs such as the Village's Citizen Corps Program, the CERT program, (Community Emergency Response Team) are partially funded by the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, with the remainder funded by the Village. The Police Department was partially reimbursed by the US Department of Justice for the purchase of bullet proof vests worn by our police officers. Police training in rapid deployment tactics for active shooting situations was funded by a federal grant offered through Representative Peter Roskam's Office and the US Department of Justice/Homeland Security Departments, and the Village also received a portion of the new police facility building costs through a grant offered by the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. For the Police Department's Labor Day weekend DUI enforcement efforts, a portion of the overtime costs associated with these details is funded by a grant received from the Illinois Department of Transportation

Our Police Department is a nationally accredited police agency through the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). The Village was reimbursed for a portion of its accreditation costs in the form of a grant received through the Village's risk management insurance provider that supports the police accreditation process.

3rd Annual Hanover Park Recycling Event Saturday, September 17, 2011 9:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. (rain or shine)

The Hanover Park Environmental Committee is sponsoring a recycling event at the Hanover Park Municipal Complex, 2121 Lake Street, Hanover Park.

Acceptable Items for Recycling Include:

- Bicycles/wheel chairs (must be in working, usable condition)
- Personal documents for shredding (Service is free and limited to three boxes total per vehicle. No businesses. No hard covers, binders, binder clips, or books. Staples and paperclips are OK.)
- Motor oil and antifreeze
- Eye glasses, hearing aids, and keys
- Scrap metal
- Large lead-acid batteries (automobile, sump pump, SLA, marine batteries only)
- Household batteries
- Cell phones and ink-jet cartridges
- CFL bulbs
- Clean, usable child and adult clothing
- Fire extinguishers
- Household office equipment and household electronic items (such as computers and monitors, TVs, VCRs, stereos, microwave ovens, cameras, video game equipment). All electronic items are recycled, none are resold or sent to organizations for re-use. Visit our website at www.hpil.org for a complete list.

Unacceptable Items Include:

- Paint, large appliances (such as refrigerators and ovens), air conditioners, water heaters, garbage disposals, propane tanks, compressed air tanks, smoke detectors, radioactive materials, ammunition, explosives, hazardous waste, chemicals, pharmaceuticals, medical waste, business waste of any kind, liquids, and regular garbage.

Community Development

If you listen to AM radio, WBBM NewsRadio 780 particularly, you've probably heard our commercials touting Hanover Park as, "Where you want to be." Featuring Stu and JJ, the commercials focus on promoting three TIF areas of the Village. TIF stands for Tax Increment Financing and it provides financial support in areas needing redevelopment and public improvements. The Village is also advertising in trade journals to promote available commercial opportunities.

On July 21st, the Village hosted their first Developers' Incentive Showcase highlighting incentives the Village can offer to assist in redevelopment projects throughout Hanover Park. The showcase included a bus tour of all three TIF districts and a presentation of specific incentives, along with an explanation of the Village Center Plan.

Held at our new, transitional health facility, the Claremont Hanover Park, this showcase attracted a number of developers and brokers.

Given the success of this event, the Village will host this event on a regular basis.

Our new Police Headquarters continues to take shape along Lake Street. Windows are in and the building is starting to come to life. Its presence adds to the enhancements and beautification work along this stretch of Lake Street.

Although the economy hasn't rebounded like expected, there are signs of promise and strength right here in Hanover Park. Our industrial vacancy rate is one of the lowest in the Chicago area, as listed by a report released by CB Richard Ellis. For the second quarter of 2011, Hanover Park has an industrial vacancy rate of only 1.92%. Of the more than 5.5 million square feet of space, barely 100,000 square feet is currently unoccupied. This compares very favorably with other surrounding communities. For example, Bartlett has a vacancy rate of 27.89%; Streamwood 35.39%; Carol Stream 14.69%; Roselle 19.31%; and, Schaumburg 11.45%.




