## Fire Engine at Station 2 Now Carries Emergency Lifesaving Equipment



As a fire engine -- with ambulance equipment. The fire engine located at Station 2 on County Farm Road has recently been outfitted with emergency lifesaving equipment.

In April, 2004, the fire engine located at Fire Station 2 on County Farm Road began operating at a Paramedic level. The engine at this station has been equipped with all necessary equipment to operate at the paramedic level so paramedics at Station 2 can use the equipment on the fire engine to provide timely advanced life support care, including IV access, emergency medications, EKG interpretation, emergency cardiac care, and other life support functions.

Although all Village ambulances provide this advanced level of emergency care, occasionally there are times when ambulances are unavailable. In these cases, the paramedic equipped engine will respond to treat the patient until an ambulance arrives. This upgrade is important because this engine has all the same treatment equipment and capabilities as the ambulance; it simply is unable to transport. Once the ambulance arrives, care and transportation is transferred to the ambulance staff.

Although the Hanover Park Fire Department has provided paramedic level care for many years, this is the first time that this level of service has been offered as part of an engine company's capabilities. The department intends to provide similar service with the north side engine later this year.

## Townhouses, Condominiums Approved for 23 Acre Site at Lake Street and Barrington Road

A major development for the area commonly referred to as the "Village Center" was approved by the Village Board in July. The mixed-use development, to be known as Church Street Station, will be located on the vacant 23 acre land parcel at the northwest corner of Lake Street and Barrington Road. This Neumann Homes development will include 126 townhomes and 168 condominiums. In addition, 35,000 square feet of commercial or retail building has been proposed.

Following extensive planning and multiple economic feasibility studies, the Village created an illustrative plan for a development comprised of both residential and commercial uses. The close proximity to the Metra Commuter Rail Station supports a Transit-Oriented Development (TOD). A TOD community relies upon adjacent commuter facilities, higher densities and a pedestrian orientation. Home ownership and adequate parking are key ingredients to the proposed residential uses. Each townhome includes two enclosed and two exterior off-street parking spaces. Condominium parking is within the buildings.

similar architectural style extends throughout the entire development. Front elevations of townhomes will include 75% brick while side elevations have a minimum of 50% brick. The condominium structures will be constructed with non-combustible building components.



The new Church Street Station development builds upon the ongoing reconstruction and improvement of the adjacent Lake Street arterial roadway.



## Minute with the Mayor . . .

The Village of Hanover Park continually prepares for everyday emergencies. However, there can be an emergency or disaster that can overwhelm our immediate response capabilities. In order to be better prepared in the event of a disaster or emergency, the Village of Hanover Park participates in the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program originally established by FEMA, the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

The CERT program helps train volunteers so they are better prepared to respond to an emergency situation, should one arise. The program gives

volunteers the decision making, organizational and practical skills to offer immediate assistance to those waiting for help. The goal of the program is to help volunteers respond effectively and efficiently without placing themselves in unnecessary danger.



When emergencies happen, CERT members provide vital assistance as they are able to support first responders, provide immediate assistance to victims and organize volunteers at a disaster site. CERT members are also trained to help with non-emergency projects that improve the safety of our community.

CERT training sessions occur over several weeks covering many topics including, but not limited to, disaster preparedness, fire safety, team organization and disaster medical operations.

Volunteers who complete CERT training have a better understanding of potential threats to their home, workplace and community. They can take the right steps to lessen the effects of these hazards. If a disaster happens that overwhelms local response capability, CERT members can apply the training learned in the classroom and during exercises to give critical support to their family, loved ones, neighbors or associates in their immediate area until help arrives. When help does arrive, CERTs provide useful information to responders and support their efforts, as directed, at the disaster site.

I would like to thank the volunteers who are participating in the CERT program. They have made a commitment to assist our public safety personnel to provide Hanover Park the best response available.

# Clerk's CORNER

The November 2nd election is fast approaching. For your convenience, the Village of Hanover Park offers both voter registration and absentee ballot voting. REMEMBER, YOUR VOTE DOES COUNT.

You need to register if you have:

- ▲ Moved. A new address requires that your voter registration information be updated.
- ▲ Changed your name. If you have gotten married or changed your name for any other reason, your new name must be registered in the County Clerk's office before you are eligible to vote again.
- ▲ Turned 18 years of age by November 2nd. You do not need to be 18 to register – the law only requires that you be 18 before you actually cast a ballot.
- ▲ Never been registered? Now is the time ... do it today!!!! Registering to vote is quick and easy. Just stop by the Village Clerk's office with two forms of identification, at least one of which must show your current address. We'll have you registered in a matter of minutes!
- ▲ Where do I go to vote? To learn where your polling place is located, check your voter's card, or call the Village Clerk's office and we'll be happy to assist you.
- ▲ In person absentee voting for those who will be out of town on November 2nd begins at the Village Hall on October 12.
- ▲ Vote by mail: You may also apply to cast your absentee ballot by mail.
- ▲ If you are a college student who will be away from home on Election Day, the Village Clerk's office can arrange to have an absentee ballot mailed to you.

## When the Power Goes Out . . . Here's What You Need to Know About Contacting Com Ed

If you experience a loss of electrical power at your home, you should report the outage to Com Ed by calling 1-800-EDISON1 (1-800-334-7661).



Your call will inform Com Ed crews that there is an outage, as well as helping them determine the area involved in the outage. Do not assume someone has called.

Calling from your home phone allows Com Ed's computers to automatically record your location and account information. If the information is available, the automated system will provide you with an expected time for repairing the problem and restoring power.

If at all possible, do not call from your cellular phone. Com Ed is unable to automatically record your location from a cellular phone, which means that you will need your Com Ed account number for the report of the outage to be completed.

Do not call the Village or 911. Village officials and our emergency police and fire personnel are unable to provide you with any information about the outage. The Village does not have special phone numbers to report outages, and when you call 911 you may be tying up the phone lines needed for actual emergencies. Calling Com Ed is the only way to report an outage and obtain information about when power should be restored.

If you have a sump pump in your basement, we recommend that you make arrangements for a back up power supply, either an automatic battery back up or an emergency generator.

Classes will be held at the Hanover Park Police Station every Tuesday night from 7:00 p.m. until 9:30 p.m. from Tuesday, September 14 through Tuesday, November 16. The Citizens' Police Academy is designed to give participants a first hand look at the various aspects of police work.

The Citizens' Police Academy is an opportunity for citizens to gain insight into the duties of police officers, while providing responsible citizens with comprehensive knowledge of police operations, practices and objectives. ## Hanover Park Fire Chief Earns Chief Fire Officer Designation

Hanover Park Fire Department Chief Craig A. Haigh has successfully completed the process that awards him the professional designation of "Chief Fire Officer". The Commission on Chief Fire Officer Designation met on May 18, 2004 to officially confer the designation upon Chief Haigh. Chief Haigh is one of only 412 Chief Fire Officers worldwide.

The Chief Fire Officer designation program is a voluntary program designed to recognize individuals who demonstrate excellence in seven measured components including: experience, education, professional development, professional contributions, association membership, community involvement, and technical competencies.

A Board of Review consisting of members of the fire and emergency services profession, academia, and municipal agencies review each applicant and recommends successful candidates for designation to the commission.

Chief Haigh is a 20-year veteran of the fire service, beginning his career as a volunteer firefighter with the Hampton Fire Department and rose through the ranks to become Chief from 1991-1995. He also worked full time for the Rock Island Fire Department until 1995 where he served as their first EMS Coordinator and was instrumental in the development of their Paramedic program. He left Hampton and Rock Island in 1995 to become Chief of the King, North Carolina Fire Department where he served until he was appointed Chief to the Village of Hanover Park's Fire Department in 2002. Chief Haigh lives in Hanover Park with his wife and two children.

Chief Haigh has a Bachelor of Science Degree in Fire and Safety Engineering from the University of Cincinnati, is a Nationally Registered Paramedic and a Field Staff Instructor with the University of Illinois Fire Service Institute.

The Hanover Park Police Department is scheduled for an on-site assessment as part of a nationally recognized program to achieve accreditation by verifying that it meets professional standards.

Administered by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, Inc. (C.A.L.E.A.), the accreditation program requires agencies to comply with state-of-the-art standards in four basic areas: policy and procedures, administration, operations and support services.


### Caputo's Fresh Markets Adds Garden Center


