## Hanover Park Kids' Homemade Flag Flies on Combat Missions with Troops in Afghanistan



The 47 children who participated in the Police And Children Together (P.A.C.T) camp last summer could never have imagined what the flag they sent overseas would mean to the troops who received it.

During the summer camp, the children made a very special American flag. Each child traced his or her handprint on red fabric, which was then placed on white cloth to form the flag's red stripes. The children then wrote messages of hope, encouragement, and thanks on their handprints.

The flag was given to a member of the South Carolina Air National Guard who flies commercial airliners for American Airlines out of O'Hare airport.

The flag was taken to a base in Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan where multi-national troops conducted air combat missions in Afghanistan during Operation Enduring Freedom.

A member of the Hanover Park Police Department, who has maintained contact with these troops, learned that they were so moved by the flag and its heartfelt messages that they took the flag with them as they flew on combat missions. They even used a disposable camera to photograph the flag in various locations as it traveled with them.

As they traced their handprints and wrote their heartfelt messages last summer, the children never could have guessed where their flag would travel and how much it would mean to the men and women who received it.

The children's messages to the troops expressed what all of us feel – gratitude for the dedication and sacrifice of those who are serving, and thankfulness for the freedom that is every American's birthright.

## Minute with the Mayor . . .

Being faced with an emergency situation once seemed a remote possibility to most of us. But recent national and world events have made it clear that being prepared for the unforeseen and the unexpected is one of the best things we can do to protect ourselves and our loved ones. Check the helpful guidelines below for important information on how to prepare for nearly any kind of disaster.

### CREATING A DISASTER PLAN

- Talk to employers and school officials about their emergency response plans.
- Plan how members of your household would stay in contact if you were separated. Identify two meeting places -- the first near your home (perhaps a tree or telephone pole); the second away from the neighborhood in case you cannot return home.
- Pick a friend or relative who lives out of the area for household members to call and report that they are okay.
- Post emergency numbers by telephones. Teach children how and when to call 911.
- Make sure everyone in your household knows how and when to shut off water, gas, and electricity at the main switches. Contact the utility companies if you have any questions.
- Take a first aid and CPR class.
- Review health and property insurance policies before disaster strikes -- make sure policies are current and that they meet your needs.
- Review life insurance policies and consider putting money in an "emergency" savings account that could be used in any crisis, as well as keeping a small amount of cash or traveler's checks at home in a safe place where you can quickly gain access to cash in case of evacuation.
- Consider ways to help neighbors who may need special assistance, such as the elderly or disabled.
- Plan ahead for pets, since they are not allowed in public shelters.

### YOUR DISASTER SUPPLY KIT

Your disaster supply kit should include enough food, water and supplies for at least three days. This kit should be kept in a designated place and be ready to "grab and go" in case you have to leave your home quickly because of a disaster. Make sure all household members know where the kit is kept.

- 1.** Stocking water is a top priority. Drinking water in emergency situations should not be rationed. Most people need at least two quarts of water daily for drinking. Very hot temperatures can double the amount of water needed.
- 2.** Store one gallon of water per day per person for cooking and/or sanitary purposes. Do not use containers that could break, such as glass bottles. Seal water containers tightly, label and store them in a cool, dry place. Change stored water every six months.
- 3.** If activity is reduced, healthy people can survive on one-half their usual food intake for an extended period of time, or without any food for several days. Food, unlike water, may be rationed safely.
- 4.** Store ready-to eat meats, fruits and vegetables, canned or boxed juices, soup, high energy foods like peanut butter, jelly, low-sodium crackers, granola bars, trail mix, vitamins, canned foods and a manual can opener. Keep canned food in a cool, dry place. To protect boxed foods from pests and to extend their shelf life, store the food in tightly closed plastic or metal containers.

Be watching for important information on recovering from disaster in my next column.

# 22 Village Streets Scheduled for Resurfacing This Spring

The Village of Hanover Park will be resurfacing 22 streets throughout the Village this spring. The work will be initiated in May and will consist of grinding approximately 2 inches of existing asphalt off of the 22 streets and replacing with a new 2 inch thick asphalt surface course. Prior to the resurfacing drainage structures will be rebuilt, sections of deteriorated pavement will be patched, and deteriorated sections of curb and gutter will be replaced. It is anticipated that the resurfacing will be completed by the end of June.

## Planning a Home Improvement Project This Spring? We've Got Classes, Information & More to Help!


Before you begin your spring projects, remember to obtain the necessary permits. All structural, electrical, mechanical and plumbing work requires a permit to be taken out through the Community Development Department.

When applying for your permit, remember that all projects will require drawings showing the scope of the work, where all items will be located, your plat of survey indicating the areas affected by this work, and the name of the contractor/individual who will be doing the work.

In coming weeks, the Village will be hosting informational classes for popular home improvement projects including patios, framing, fences, electrical, driveways, and

heating systems. These classes are given to groups of four or larger. The classes are intended for Hanover Park residents only.

# Clerk's CORNER

▲ **Mandatory scavenger service:** The Village requires that all garbage, refuse and recycling services be provided by a licensed, residential scavenger who has entered into a franchise contract with the Village to provide service to all single-family dwelling units. The resident shall pay all fees associated with the service.

▲ **Planning an outdoor project that requires any type of digging?** Then plan to call J.U.L.I.E. (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators) at 1-800-892-0123 at least two days (excluding Saturdays and Sundays) before you plan to dig. J.U.L.I.E. provides FREE locating and marking of underground utilities. Illinois law requires a call to J.U.L.I.E. prior to digging to prevent the accidental severing of utility lines.





## Spring Hydrant Flushing Begins April 7

Starting Monday, April 7 and continuing through April 18, the Village Water Division will be flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Signs will be posted in designated areas prior to flushing.

Residents should not wash laundry during the flushing hours as rust staining of clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Hydrants will be flushed according to the following schedule:

### COOK COUNTY

#### April 7, 8, 9

South of Irving Park Road, north of Lake Street, west of Barrington Road

#### April 10, 11

South of Irving Park Road and east of Barrington Road, (Hanover Highlands and Longmeadows South Areas)

#### April 14, 15, 16, 17, 18

Jensen Boulevard east to Farmstead Lane, north of Irving Park Road to Cynthia Lane and Hastings Lane.

### DUPAGE COUNTY

#### April 7, 8, 9, 10

South of Devon Avenue, east of Church Road, west of Arlington Drive East (Greenbrook Area) Fremont and Glens area.

#### April 11, 14

South of Stearns Road, north of Schick Road

#### April 15, 16, 17, 18

South of Schick Road to Army Trail Road, east of Bayside Drive to west of Kuhn Road and west of Windjammer Lane.

***Schedule subject to change due to weather conditions or emergencies!***

## Wood Chips – Free for the Taking!

The Village will deliver loads of wood chips, a by-product of the Village's brush pickup program, to residents free of charge.

Each load will average about four cubic yards – enough to fill an area six feet by six feet by three feet high (6' x 6' x 3'). The Public Works Department will deliver the wood chips and will dump them in the driveway only. Wood chips will not be dumped on driveway aprons, sidewalks, or lawns.

## Gypsy Moths: How to Recognize Them, What To Do About Them


The gypsy moth is a leaf-eating insect that feasts on trees and shrubs. In large populations, it is capable of stripping plants bare, leaving them vulnerable to secondary insect and disease attacks.

Male gypsy moths are brown with black markings and have a wingspan of about an inch and a half. The females have wingspans of up to two inches and are white or cream-colored. Remember, if it's white and flies, it's NOT a gypsy moth as gypsy moths are too heavy to fly.

The gypsy moth is migrating west and is beginning to establish itself in Illinois. The state has had isolated infestations, all of which have been eradicated. These infestations primarily have

occurred in the northeast, although gypsy moths have been found as far south as Peoria.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Environmental Programs participates in the "Slow the Spread" program, a joint local, state and federal effort to reduce and control the spread of the gypsy moth. If you see a gypsy moth in any stage of life call toll free: 1-866-296-MOTH(6684)



Remember, the best defense to gypsy moths is a well-watered, fertilized, trimmed, healthy tree that can withstand a one-time defoliation by the insect.

# Ready to Get Rid of the Winter's Accumulation of Brush & Branches? Brush Pickup Resumes April 7

The Hanover Park Village Brush Pickup Program will take place in April. Please refer to the 2003 Village Calendar for specific information about the program.

## Set-Out Time – 7:00 AM

Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 AM on your pick up day. Please do not put brush out after 7:00 AM on the first day of your collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pickup. The Village incurs considerable cost returning to an area to collect brush set out after the first day of the collection cycle. It may take more than one day to pick up all the brush in a designated area. If brush is not picked up on the first day, it will still be picked up.

## Brush Pickup Schedule

### April 7th – Area 1:

Streets north of Lake Street and west of Barrington Road.

### April 14th – Area 2:

Streets north of Lake Street and east of Barrington Road

### April 21st – Area 3:

Streets south of Lake Street and north of Lawrence Avenue

### April 28th – Area 4:

Streets south of Lawrence Avenue

## What will be picked up:

- Branches a minimum of 2 feet in length up to a maximum of 10 feet in length, and less than eight inches in diameter.

## What will NOT be picked up:


- Small hedge or pine clippings.
- Yard waste or brush in containers.
- Brush or branches with thorns.
- Tree stumps and roots.

## How to stack the brush:

- Brush should be stacked in one direction with the butt end toward the street.
- No lumber, wire, rope, or other materials may be included with the brush.
- Brush must NOT block the sidewalk.

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## Curb Appeal Inspection Program begins in April **Maintaining Your Property Benefits Everyone!**

The Curb Appeal Program for single family homes begins in April. Village Community Service/Code Enforcement Officers (CEOs) visit every neighborhood in the Village looking for property maintenance code compliance. The exterior of each home, as well as the yard, will be inspected. If violations are found, a CEO will try to make contact with the resident to explain the violations and work to find solutions. If there is no response, a door hanger will be left as a reminder, identifying the violations. The resident will then be given time to correct the violation. Many times, residents are simply unaware of violations which can be easily corrected. If there are questions, call the CEO at the number listed on the door hanger for an explanation of the violation or how to comply.

Here are a few common violations that are relatively easy to correct:

- Remove weeds and keep grass cut in your yard and parkway.
- Maintain your property free of debris. Garbage containers should NOT be stored in the front yard or corner side yard. Containers located in the side yard must be screened from view.
- Parking of vehicles is allowed only on paved surfaces, not on grass; this includes RVs, boats and motorcycles.
- Only one automobile or other vehicle may be stored on a driveway if it is covered with a commercially-manufactured, opaque, and form fitting cover in GOOD CONDITION. No tarps allowed!
- Auto parts cannot be stored on driveways. Detached snow plows are only permitted on driveways from November 1 through April 30.
- All windows that can be opened must be screened, all year round.
- Garage sale or real estate signs MAY NOT be placed in the parkway.
- Parking of commercial vehicles is not allowed in a residential district except for delivery. This applies to vehicles that weigh more than 8,000 lbs. and have a license plate other than a B truck plate.

The Commercial Exterior Inspection Program is an inspection program for all businesses in Hanover Park. The building exterior, along with parking lot, loading areas, dumpster areas, fences, and parking lot lighting are inspected. Noncompliance with Village codes will result in notices, tickets, and fines. Business owners are encouraged to contact the Village Commercial Property Inspector at 630/372-4287 for more information about this program.

The Multiple-Family Inspection Program is now underway and includes inspection of all apartments in Hanover Park. Tenants and landlords are responsible for neat, clean, safe and sanitary conditions. Inspections include checks for overcrowding.
