New Lighting, Traffic Signals, Bike Path, All Part of Lake Street Improvement Project

The orange road construction signs are up, the traffic cones are in place, and crews have already begun the \$13.2 million dollar widening and reconstruction of Lake Street from the Elgin/O'Hare Expressway to East Bartlett Road.

The project, under the jurisdiction of the Illinois Department of Transportation, started June 23, 2003, and is expected to be completed by June of 2005. The roadway will be widened from four to six lanes from the Elgin/O'Hare Expressway to Church Street, and widened to five lanes west of Church Street.

Other improvements include roadway lighting, a ten foot wide bike path, and a new traffic signal at the intersection of Lake Street and Center Avenue. In addition, the entrance *(continued on page 4)*

Hanover Park Joins Cape Coast Sister City to Combat HIV/AIDS in Africa

The U.S. State Department Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs announced recently that Hanover Park would receive a \$17,500 grant to develop HIV/AIDS awareness and educational programs in its Sister City of Cape Coast, Ghana in West




Africa. Hanover Park's grant is one of only seven such awards issued to Sister Cities organizations with African partners.

The program is designed for easy implemen-

tation and sustainability, with special emphasis on fostering awareness of risk and promoting behavior changes crucial to the control and eventual eradication of the disease.

Educational strategies include teaching prevention to people who don't believe it can happen to them or believe that infection is inevitable; stigma reduction strategies for people living with HIV/AIDS; and engaging political, religious, cultural and other leaders in public education efforts; grass-roots mobilization and advocacy.

The program has three components: (1) educational outreach to high school students; (2) partnering with local clinics and the hospital to reach the adult population, including pro-active outreach to parents' organizations, civic and religious



groups; (3) addressing home health-care needs of the afflicted as well as family members, especially minor children.

As a first step in officially implementing the grant, Dr. Kobina Bentsi-Enchill, chairperson of the Cape

Coast HIV/AIDS Committee, has completed a two-week visit to Hanover Park

and the surrounding area, observing programs at Alexian Brothers Bonaventure House, Open Door Clinic and BE-HIV, as well as meeting with a variety of local suburban healthcare professionals.

The people-to-people friendship between Hanover Park and Cape Coast, which began in July 1991, has included educational, humanitarian, and cultural exchanges. The Village of Hanover Park regularly sends shipments of relief goods to its Sister City, including clothing, text and reading books, educational materials, and computer equipment. Medical supplies and equipment are donated through local doctors, Alexian Brothers Medical Center, and the Illinois Partners for Global Health.



to the Village Hall complex will be realigned to take advantage of the new Center Avenue traffic signal. Initial work to be undertaken by the contractor includes: tree removal, temporary traffic signals, temporary pavement widening on the south side of Lake Street, and extensive utility relocation work. The bulk of the actual roadway reconstruction work will take place during 2004.

The 45 space commuter parking lot at the southeast corner of County Farm Road and Lake Street was closed permanently

on June 23. Effective June 24, 2003, some of the spaces along Lake Street in the main commuter lot may be closed each day.

To date the following work has been completed: tree removal, installation of a silt fence, median removal, excavation and forming for a retainer wall at the commuter parking lot, excavation of the existing detention pond at the northwest corner of Barrington Road and Lake Street, construction of temporary drainage structures, and pole installation for temporary traffic signals.





Village's Newest Ambulance Provides Residents With Latest Life-Saving Technology

The Hanover Park Fire Department recently took delivery of a 2003 MedTec Ambulance, one of a new generation of ambulances that carries equipment for both medical emergencies and firefighting.

The unit is housed at Fire Station 2 at 3855 County Farm Road. In addition to




being a fully equipped Advanced Life Support/Mobile Intensive Care Unit, the ambulance is also equipped with basic firefighting equipment including self contained breathing apparatus, fire extinguishers, forcible entry tools, hooks to open walls and ceilings, and hydrant/water supply tools.

Although the price tag was hefty -- the ambulance cost just over \$112,000 without equipment -- it is expected to be a part of the Village's fleet for about the next nine years.

Hanover Park Honored with 2003 DuPage River Clean Water Award


The Conservation Foundation recently presented its annual DuPage River Clean Water Award to Hanover Park's Sewage Treatment Plant. Hanover Park's treatment plant was recognized as the plant that exceeded the water discharge performance standings during 2002.

Conservation Foundation President and CEO Brook McDonald stated, "Coupled with land preservation along the waterway and volunteer efforts to clean the stream of debris, the improvements in sewage discharge has helped to significantly improve the DuPage River's water quality."

Outdoor Emergency Sirens: When They are Activated, What They Mean



For the safety of its residents, the Village of Hanover Park maintains an Emergency Alerting System designed to warn of impending danger from severe weather or an attack on the United States. Local television and radio stations also participate in the Emergency Alerting System. Local broadcasts can be an excellent source of up-to-date information during an emergency.

Outdoor warning sirens have been strategically placed throughout the Village. These warning devices are designed to alert those who are outdoors of impending severe weather or a military attack. In many cases, these warning devices can also be heard by those who are inside a building.

There are two standardized warning signals established by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and used by the Village of Hanover Park to alert the public and to indicate survival actions to be taken in an emergency. These signals are the ATTACK WARNING and the ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL.

ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL

An ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL is a three to five minute **wavering siren** tone. The ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL means that an actual attack or missile launch against the United States has been detected and that protective action should be taken immediately. Per federal guidance, "this signal will be used for no other purpose and will have no other meaning."

ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL

An ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL is a three to five minute **steady signal** from sirens. Note: The sirens are mounted atop elevated platforms and rotate in order to be heard in all directions. The ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL will change in volume as the siren rotates toward and away from the listener. This should not be mistaken for the ATTACK WARNING SIGNAL which is a rapidly wavering tone. The ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL indicates to all persons to move to a place of safety and "turn on your radio or television and listen for essential emergency information." The Village of Hanover Park will activate the ATTENTION or ALERT WARNING SIGNAL in the event of any of the following:

- ❑ A confirmed sighting of a tornado or funnel cloud aloft, reported by a trained weather spotter, within five miles of any point within the Village of Hanover Park.
- ❑ A confirmed sighting, by a trained weather spotter, of severe winds causing structural damage within five miles of any point within the Village of Hanover Park.
- ❑ The receipt of a tornado warning, issued by the National Weather Service, indicating that the Village of Hanover Park is in the direct path of an oncoming tornado.

In the event of activation of either of these warning signals, residents should move to a place of safety and monitor radio and television stations for additional information, including when the danger has passed. Please note that there is no siren activation to indicate that the danger has passed.

Safety Information For You And Your Family

The Federal Emergency Management Agency's Community and Family Preparedness Program and the American Red Cross Community Disaster Education Program are nationwide efforts to help people prepare for disasters of all types. Grant Helps Cover Cost of New Pavilion, Playground Equipment, at Ranger Park

Ranger Park has a whole new look, thanks to a \$400,000 grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Located east of Barrington Road across from the Westview Shopping Center, Ranger Park is one of the largest parks in Hanover Park, as well as the northern gateway to the Village.

The \$400,000 grant enabled the Park District to give Ranger Park a "face lift," including a new pavilion overlooking the lake, new playground equipment, erosion control along the banks of the lake, and installation of shrubs and flowers throughout the park.

This community enhancement project was made possible through the efforts of the Hanover Park Park Foundation. Although many people are unaware of the organization's existence, the Foundation was created to "hold" land donated to the Village by developers until such time as the value of the land can be used as the local matching share for State of Illinois grants. The Hanover Park Park Foundation is comprised of elected officials and senior staff members from both the Hanover Park Park District and the Village.

In order to make the Ranger Park redevelopment a reality, the value of the park land (\$400,000), which had been held under the jurisdiction of the Park Foundation, was used as the local



share needed to obtain the matching grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

Similarly, in 1986, \$185,000 of the cost of developing East and West Harbor Parks, located in the southern part of the Village, was funded through Park Foundation land. Once the land value is pledged as the local match, the Park Foundation Board releases ownership of the land to the Park District for open space use. The end result is that residents have new or improved parks to enjoy at little or no cost to local taxpayers.

Cops, Kids and Camp: A Time of Building Strong Friendships, Patriotism, and Community Service



The Hanover Park Police Department, in cooperation with the Law Enforcement Foundation of Illinois, recently sponsored the Police and Children Together Camp (P.A.C.T.). This annual event, held this year from June 23-27, provided summer fun for 49 children from 11 to 14 years of age. The children are selected from schools in Hanover Park, Bartlett and Streamwood. The camp is led by Police officers representing these three towns, as well as police department employees and counselors from the Renz Addiction Center.

The children spend a constructive week with these leaders, emphasizing activities focusing on team building, patriotism and community service. The campers met every morning for exercise and instruction at the Springwood Middle School. The many daily activities included a visit from the Illinois National Guard, a presentation from K-9 Officer Rumble, swimming at the Seafari Springs Water Park, roller-skating at Main Street Roller Rink, lunch at Famous Dave's, dodge ball, crafts, bowling at Bowling and Beyond, serving lunch to the senior residents at the Devonshire, and a graduation ceremony following a cookout on the last day of the camp. All of the children walked away with a positive outlook and many new friends.



A FIRST HAND LOOK AT FIREFIGHTING

On June 16, 2003, Fire Department personnel participated in a "Day Camp" hosted by Evangel Church. About 150 children attended the event. SOME QUICK REMINDERS ABOUT KIDS, CARS, AND SCHOOL BUSES:

- Vehicles in both directions must stop when a school bus is flashing the red lights on its stop sign.
- School buses do not use red flashing lights and extended STOP arms at special designated loading zones off the roadway, such as on school property. At these stops, the bus driver may activate the amber warning lights. Motorists should use caution, but are not required to stop.
- School buses use the red flashing lights and extended STOP arm on four lane streets. On these streets, the bus pulls up to the right curb to load and unload students. Motorists are required to stop when approaching from the rear.
