

## Police Arrest "Coupon Robber" and Announce 2000 Crime Rate Decrease

On March 15th, Mayor Bock and the Village Board commended eight police officers for their outstanding work of apprehending an offender in a string of robberies who came to be known as the "coupon robber."

After a store in the Westview Shopping Center was robbed in February, the Police Department crime analyst researched similar robberies that had occurred in neighboring communities. The crime analyst was able to determine from previous patterns that the offender would probably strike again at a store in the same shopping center. A stake-out team was put in place on February 24th during the timeframe and at the location predicted.

Just as predicted, the offender returned to the shopping center and to one of the two stores under surveillance. When he presented his "coupon," actually a note informing the store clerk that this was a robbery, the stakeout team took position. They calmly and professionally apprehended the offender after he exited the store. The offender later confessed to having committed 14 robberies in surrounding communities, only one of which was in Hanover Park.

This is just one example of the Police Department's proactive and aggressive stance on crime, which has lead to the Village's lowest crime rate in over 20 years! For more information on the 2000 crime rate, turn to page 6.

## Minute with the Mayor

Great News!! The Chicago Tribune recently published results from the 2000 Census. The population of the Village of Hanover Park is listed at 38,278. This figure, coupled with the growth of our commercial and industrial area to almost 4,000,000 square feet (under roof), has made Hanover Park a desirable place to live.

The population number is an unofficial number as we have not received official notification from the Census Bureau. The population number was released under Public Law 94-171, the Redistricting Summary File, which contains population information used as the building blocks for local redistricting. The data items include total population, population tabulated by 63 race categories, and cross-tabulated by Hispanic origin and voting age population (18 years and older). The next major release of census information will occur this summer under Summary File 1. This file presents selected population and housing characteristics collected from all people and housing units. This information includes population by age, sex, race, and Hispanic origin; numbers and types

of houses; and whether housing units are owned or rented.

The next major release of census information will occur in the summer and fall of 2002. This will be the first release of data collected from the sample or long-form questionnaire. Among the socio-economic characteristics are marital status, ancestry, migration, educational attainment, disability, labor force status, journey to work, income, poverty, home value, monthly rent, vehicles available, and the year the dwelling unit was built.

The population of the state of Illinois is 12,419,293, which is up 988,691, or 8.6%, since the 1990 census. Illinois is the fifth most populous state in the United States. The most populous state in the country is California, followed by Texas, New York and Florida. Illinois will lose one seat in the House of Representatives, falling from 20 seats to 19 seats, despite the population gain of nearly one million people. At this point, it is unknown how the population will affect revenue distributions, however, I would estimate the Village would maintain its current level of revenue distribution or slightly increase that distribution. The state of Illinois passed up Pennsylvania as the nation's fifth most populous state in the 2000 census.

When the Village was incorporated in 1958, the population was 305. Based upon the results of the recent Census, the future of Hanover Park looks very promising with more families, as well as businesses, relocating to Hanover Park.

### FIRE SAFETY ALERT... Plant Fire-Safe Landscaping

Fire-safe landscaping is an effective tool that creates an area of defensible space between your home and flammable vegetation that protects against devastating fires. The United States Fire Administration (USFA) encourages you to keep fire safety at the forefront by learning how to landscape and maintain your property to minimize possible fire damage and slow fires if they start.

#### Defensible Space Works

In a fire situation, the dead trees and shrubs surrounding your home act as fuel for fire. Removing flammable vegetation reduces the threat of fire. Follow these basic rules to create defensible space that works.

- Remove all dead plants, trees, and shrubs from the site.
- Reduce excess leaves, plant parts, and low-hanging branches.

The choice of plants, spacing, and maintenance are crucial elements in

any defensible space landscaping plan.

#### Tips for a Fire-Safe Landscape

- Create a defensible space perimeter by thinning trees and brush within 30 feet around your home.
- Beyond 30 feet, remove dead wood, debris, and low tree branches.
- Eliminate small trees and plants growing under trees. They allow ground fires to jump into tree crowns.
- Plant the most drought-tolerant vegetation within three feet of your home and adjacent to structures to prevent ignition.
- Provide at least a 10- to 15-foot separation between islands of shrubs and plant groups to effectively break up continuity of vegetation.

#### Choose Fire Resistant Materials

- Use rock, mulch, flower beds, and gardens as ground cover for bare

spaces and as effective firebreaks.

- There are no “fireproof” plants. Select high moisture plants that grow close to the ground and have a low sap or resin content.
- Fire-resistant shrubs include hedging roses, bush honeysuckles, currant, cotoneaster, sumac, and shrub apples.
- Plant hardwood, maple, poplar, and cherry trees that are less flammable than pine, fir, and other conifers.

#### Maintain Your Home and Surrounding Property

- Maintain a well-pruned and watered landscape to serve as a green belt and protection against fire.
- Keep plants green during the dry season and use supplemental irrigation, if necessary.
- Trim grass on a regular basis.

## Police Department News

### Police Officers Recognized for Outstanding Service

Mayor Bock and Police Chief Ron Moser recognized Police Officers George Sullivan and Jon Casey at the March 1st Village Board meeting. Officers Sullivan and Casey observed a rollover accident in Schaumburg on January 8th. They called for emergency assistance and determined that there was a victim trapped and suffering from a severe head wound. The officers were able to lift the vehicle off the victim to relieve the pressure which was aggravating the injury. A three-year-old child strapped in a car seat was uninjured.



Mayor Bock and Police Chief Ron Moser also recognized Police Officers Dave Bruno, Mark Walther, and Travis Hauri at the March 1st Village Board meeting. Officers Bruno, Walther, and Hauri took part in the arrest of a known gang member on November 1st and subsequently recovered two illegal weapons.

## Police Department News

### Major Crime Decreases AGAIN in 2000

In 1999, the Hanover Park Police Department reported the lowest number of Part I crimes since this type of reporting began in 1974. Part I crimes are the eight crimes that are reported to the FBI and are listed in the Uniform Crime Reports which establish a jurisdiction's crime rate. These crimes include murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, theft, motor vehicle theft, and arson. The 1999 crime rate was down 27% from the previous year.

The 2000 crime rate is down another 7% from 1999, making it the Village's lowest crime rate in 26 years. (See the graph at the right.)

In comparison to the National and State crime rates, Hanover Park is significantly lower. The 2000 crime rate is **44% lower** than the National rate and **50% lower** than the Illinois crime rate.




In terms of lesser offenses (such a vandalism) considered Part II crimes, the Village

saw a 7% reduction over 1999 (which was 7% lower than the previous year.) For the last two years, the Police Department has seen a reduction in both Part I and II crime in Hanover Park.

The Village has also seen a reduction of graffiti, largely due to the Village's Graffiti Removal Program. The Police Department also saw a significant reduction in gang-related activity in 2000.

The Police Department has developed an aggressive approach on dealing with crime in the Village. In 2000, there were more officers on patrol and fewer in specialized positions than ever before. This increase in police presence on the street has been a significant factor in deterring crime.

Dispatched calls for service increased 1% while the departments self-initiated activity went up 12%. This is a clear indication of the proactive approach being utilized by Police Chief Ron Moser and the Police Department.

#### Get Your Building Permit Now!

If you are planning a home improvement project, don't forget to stop by the Community Development Department to pick up your building permit!

Community Development staff members are available 8 AM to 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday to answer questions. The Community Development counter is also open until 7:30 PM the first Thursday of every month. From May through September the counter will be open every Thursday night until 7:30 PM.

**All residents should be aware that it takes approximately 15-20 working days to complete plan reviews. The earlier you apply for a permit, the earlier you can begin your improvement project. Plan reviews are typically needed for swimming pools, hot tubs, decks, room additions, garages, basement remodeling, and interior remodeling.**

## Hydrant Flushing Begins in April

The Village Water Division is currently flushing hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing occurs between the hours of 7:15 AM and 2:45 PM. Notices are posted in designated areas prior to flushing.

Please **DO NOT WASH LAUNDRY** during the flushing hours as rust stains may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so that the unit does not regenerate during this period.

The Village flushes hydrants for several reasons, including:

1. Flushing improves water quality by removing minerals such as iron and magnesium that have collected in the water mains.
2. Flushing improves water flow; by removing minerals, the diam-

eter of the water main is increased.

3. Flushing allows for the hydrants to be inspected and properly maintained, essential in the event the hydrant is needed in an emergency.

The schedule for hydrant flushing by area will be as follows:

### Cook County

#### April 2, 3, & 4

South of Irving Park Rd., north of Lake St., west of Barrington Rd.

#### April 5 & 6

South of Irving Park Rd. and east of Barrington Rd. (Hanover Highlands and Longmeadows South areas).

#### April 9, 10, & 11

Jensen Blvd. east to Farmstead Ln., north of Irving Park Rd. to Cynthia Ln. and Hastings Ln.

### DuPage County

#### April 2, 3, 4, & 5

South of Devon, east of Church Rd., west of Arlington Drive East (Greenbrook, Fremont, and Glens areas).

#### April 6 & 9

South of Stearns Rd., north of Schick Rd.

#### April 10, 11, & 12

South of Schick Rd. to Army Trail Rd., east of Bayside Dr. to west of Kuhn Rd., and west of Windjammer Ln.

**This schedule is subject to change due to weather conditions or emergencies!**

## April Brush Pickup Program

The Village Brush pickup program began April 2nd. Please **do not set your brush out after your scheduled pickup day. You can either utilize BFI yardwaste collection or wait until the next Village brush collection in July.**

Please refer to your Solid Waste Services Newsletter or Village Calendar for additional information.

### What will be picked up:

- Branches that are at least two feet long, no more than ten feet long, and less than eight inches in diameter.

### What will NOT be picked up:

- Small hedge or pine clippings.
- Yardwaste or brush in containers.

- Brush or branches with thorns.
- Stumps or tree roots.

### How to stack the brush:

- Neatly stack the brush in one direction with the butt end toward the street.
- No lumber, wire, rope, or other material may be included with the brush.
- Do not block the sidewalk when putting brush out!

### Set-out Time

Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 AM on your pickup day.

**Please do NOT put brush out after 7:00 AM on the first day of the collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pickup.**

### April 2nd

Area 1: Streets north of Lake St. and west of Barrington Rd.

### April 9th

Area 2: Streets north of Lake St. and east of Barrington Rd.

### April 16th

Area 3: Streets south of Lake St. and north of Lawrence Ave.

### April 23rd

Area 4: Streets south of Lawrence Ave.

## Public Works

### Record December Snow

Hanover Park received just over 40 inches of snow in December, causing the Public Works Department to work, and work, and work to keep streets clear. Here's a summary of what December looked like "from the plow"...

Man hours worked (regular).....**400**  
Overtime hours worked.....**832**  
Miles plowed:.....**13,257**  
Tons of salt used:.....**671**

Federal disaster funds were made available for 21 Illinois counties for the winter storms that produced record snowfalls in December. Local agencies were reimbursed 75% of the total costs of equipment, contracts, and personnel overtime related to emergency services in dealing with the snow for any 48-hour period between December 10-31.

The Village expects to receive over \$34,000 in federal funds which will keep the Public Works Department within their snow removal budget.

### Free Wood Chips!

The Village will deliver loads of wood chips, a by-product of the Village's brush pickup program, to residents free of charge.

Each load will average about four cubic yards. The Public Works Department will deliver the wood chips and will dump them in the driveway only. Wood chips will not be dumped on driveway aprons, sidewalks, or lawns.

## Village Employment Opportunities
