Fire Department—Learn about Fire Escape Plans



In the event of a fire, every second counts, and you and your family must be prepared.

Escape plans help you get out of your home quickly. In less than 30 seconds, a small flame can get out of control and turn into a major fire. It only takes minutes for a house to fill with thick black smoke and become engulfed in flames.

Prepare and practice your fire escape plan twice a year with everyone in your household, including children and people with disabilities. It is also a good idea to practice your plan with overnight guests. Some tips to consider when preparing your escape plan include:

- Draw a map of each level of your home and show all doors and windows. Find two ways to get out of each room. Make sure all doors and windows that lead outside open easily.
- Only purchase collapsible escape ladders evaluated by a recognized testing laboratory, such as Underwriters Laboratory (UL). Use the ladder only in a real emergency.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you cannot help them.
- Have a plan for everyone in your home who has a disability.
- Practice your fire escape plan at night and during the day.



Immediately Leave the Home

When a fire occurs, get out fast, you may only have seconds to escape safely. Take the safest exit route but, if you must escape through smoke, remember to crawl low under the smoke and keep your mouth covered. The smoke contains toxic gases, which can disorient you or, overcome you.

Never Open Doors that are Hot to the Touch

When you come to a closed door, feel the doorknob and door to make sure that fire is not on the other side. If either is hot, leave the door closed and use your secondary escape route. If the door feels cool, open it slowly. Be ready to shut it quickly if heavy smoke or fire is present. If you can't get out, close the door and cover vents and cracks around doors to keep the smoke out. Call 9-1-1 or your local emergency number. Say where you are and signal for help at the window with a light-colored cloth or a flashlight.

Designate a Meeting Place Outside and Take Attendance

Designate a meeting location a safe distance in front of your home. For example, meet under a specific tree or at the end of the driveway or front sidewalk to make sure everyone has gotten out safely and no one will be hurt looking for someone who is already safe. Make sure everyone in your home knows how to call 9-1-1 or your local emergency number and that your house number can be seen day or night from the street.

Once Out, Stay Out

Remember to escape first and then notify the fire department using the 9-1-1 system or proper local emergency number in your area. Never go back into a burning building for any reason. Teach children not to hide from firefighters. If someone is missing, or pets are trapped inside your home, tell the firefighters. They are equipped to perform rescues safely.



Public Works - 2012 Roadway Projects

Roadway improvement projects for 2012 in Hanover Park include total reconstruction of an existing deteriorated concrete street, patching on two existing asphalt streets, and the resurfacing of 15 additional streets. Reconstruction will take place on Gladiola Avenue and consist of removal of the existing concrete pavement and the construction of a new bituminous asphalt pavement. This reconstruction project will include new storm sewers, curb and gutters, driveway aprons and parkway trees. A tentative schedule for this street reconstruction project could begin in early June with completion by the end of July. The estimated cost of the street reconstruction is approximately \$350,000 and is being financed through the Village's Motor Fuel Tax Fund.

In addition, the Village of Hanover Park will be resurfacing 15 streets this spring and completing patching on two additional streets, Niven and Sinatra Lanes. The work should begin in May and consist of grinding approximately 2" of existing asphalt and replacing with a new 2" thick asphalt surface course. Prior to resurfacing, drainage structures will be rebuilt, sections of the deteriorated pavement will be patched, and deteriorated sections of curb and gutter will be replaced. The resurfacing is expected to be completed by the end of July and is also being financed through the Village's Motor Fuel Tax Fund.

Public Works—2012 Brush Pick Up Schedule

The Brush Pick Up Program provides FREE curbside pickup and chipping of branches, which are then reused as mulch. Brush will be picked up in April, July, and October.

What will be picked up:

Branches with a minimum of two (2) feet in length and a maximum of ten (10) feet in length and less than eight (8) inches in diameter.

What will not be picked up:

- Small hedge or pine clippings
- Yard waste or brush in containers
- Brush or branches with thorns
- Stumps or tree roots

How to stack brush:

- Neatly stack the brush in one direction with the butt end toward the street
- No lumber, wire, rope or other material may be included with the brush
- Do not block the sidewalk when putting brush out

Set Out Time:

Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 a.m. of your scheduled pick up period. Do not put brush out after 7:00 a.m. on the first day of the collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pick up. The Village incurs considerable cost returning to an area to collect brush set out after the first day of the collection cycle.

Brush Pick Up Schedule: April 2nd, July 2nd, October 1st

Area 1: Streets north of Lake Street and west of Barrington Road


Area 2: Streets north of Lake Street and east of Barrington Road

Brush Pick Up Schedule: April 16th, July 16th, October 15th

Area 3: Streets south of Lake Street and north of Lawrence Avenue

Area 4: Streets south of Lawrence Avenue

Curbside yard waste collection will be provided by Allied Waste Services once a week on Fridays beginning April 6 through November 30, 2012.

Yard waste stickers are required for curbside pickup.

Sewer Service Line Warranty Program

In response to residents’ concerns over the rising costs of maintaining and replacing the sanitary sewer service lines, the Village Board entered into a marketing agreement, through the National League of Cities, with Service Line Warranties of America (SLWA). This agreement allows SLWA to provide a voluntary service line warranty program to the residents of Hanover Park that covers repairs to their sanitary sewer service lines. The program, available for a monthly fee, provides the homeowner with a 24 hour answering service if the resident were to experience sewer backups. The program uses local plumbers to complete the repairs for the homeowner. The program covers up to \$4,000 worth of repairs on private property and an additional \$4,000 if the work is required in the public right of way. Information for the program will be mailed to all residences in the Village in the next several weeks.

Public Works—2012 Hydrant Flushing Schedule

Beginning Monday, April 30th through Friday, May 11th, the Village Water Division will flush hydrants throughout the Village. The flushing will occur between 6:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., and notices will be posted in designated areas prior to flushing. Residents should not wash laundry during the flushing hours, as rust staining of clothing may result. Residents with water softeners are encouraged to check the cycle time of their softeners so the unit does not regenerate during this period.

Barrington Road Streetscape Rendering

Thanks to the mild winter, **the Barrington Road Streetscape project** is well underway! This project will create an attractive and informative northern gateway to the Village. It will include full streetscape plantings along a landscape wall, a public seating area, and an entryway sign along Barrington Road, northwest of Irving Park Road. In collaboration with the Village and Hanover Park Park District, this state-of-the-art sign will provide information on local activities and programs. This was the final project funded by taxes set aside for redevelopment of the area as a part of the Village's Tax Increment Financing District (TIF) #2, and we look

forward to the community and property benefits it will provide.

Another exciting project is beginning at the **Hanover Square Shopping Center at Barrington Road and Lake Street**. On December 20, 2011, the Village purchased Hanover Square with funds from the Village Center TIF #3. The 113,000 square foot shopping center has served the community for over 40 years, and the Village is working to return it to an attractive and profitable enterprise. Plans are in motion for the redevelopment of the center to include facility repairs, façade improvements, parking lot paving, and new signage. Staff is working with the management team of Schermerhorn & Company to operate the center and assist existing tenants.

Through commercials on **WBBM NewsRadio 780**, the Village is actively seeking new tenants to bring life back to the many vacant storefronts. Potential new tenants include a collaborative Workforce Center, to provide classes and services from Elgin Community College, Harper College, and WorkNet. The Village will also hold several community events onsite, such as Touch-a-Truck.

The revitalization of Hanover Square is a first step in the development of **the Village Center around the intersection of Barrington Road and Lake Street**. After months of planning and public input, the Village is now finalizing the Village Center Plan, which will guide future mixed-use development around the Hanover Park Metra station. The Village Center will serve as a gathering place to include community facilities, retail,



Hanover Park History tells us

27W281 Ontarioville Road and 27W285 Ontarioville Road



History tells us that in 1873 the Chicago and Pacific Railroad was expanding from Chicago to Galena, Illinois. During this expansion, Luther Bartlett purchased a few hundred acres in anticipation of

this expansion. This was the birth of Ontarioville.

As Mr. Bartlett sold land along the RR tracks, Ontarioville was made into a RR stop from which he donated property used to build the Ontarioville Station located west of the current Hanover Park Metra Station.

In 1874, Mr. Louis Liesburg purchased lands along the tracks. He subdivided the property naming it Liesburg Subdivision and converted the land into lots to be sold to farmers wanting to settle into the area.

In 1876 Mr. Liesburg sold a small swatch of land to Mr. & Mrs. Fred Fuerhaken who then passed it down to their daughter Mervia Feurhaken. Mervia married Fred Benner in the early 1900’s turning the buildings into their home and a barn for storage and use during the farming season.

In 1957 the lots from the Benner family were again subdivided and called the Benner Subdivision. Some of these lots ended up with Melrose Park Bank and Trust, whether through purchase and/ or foreclosure. The lots housing the Benner household and barn

were purchased by Patrick Parelli from Melrose Park Bank Trust who turned them into a News agency for the area newspaper and Chicago newspapers.

In 1966 the properties were bought by Ed and Cleo O’Neill, who made it their home until they sold the property in 1997 to the current owners, Bob and Anita Komoroski. Both buildings went through extensive renovations by the Komoroski family, and what you see today is from their efforts and hard work to restore some of our area history.

Today, these lots house A&A Music (27W281 Ontarioville Road) and Ontarioville Art Gallery (27W285 Ontarioville Road).
