

Village Installs New Entryway Signs

In May, the Village installed two new entryway signs on Irving Park Road. The signs, which are located at Astor Avenue and Wise Road, are the first of five to be installed this year. Over the next few months, signs will be installed at Schick Road at the corporate limit, Stearns Road at Redford Lane, and Gary Avenue at Lake Street. The total cost of these five signs, including installation, is \$25,000.

Next year, three additional signs will be installed at the terminus of the Elgin-O'Hare Expressway on Lake Street, Gary Avenue at Central Avenue, and Army Trail at Kuhn Road. An additional sign is planned for Village Hall and will be installed after Lake Street reconstruction is completed.

There are two styles for the signs; one is the monument style pictured below, and the other is a post-style sign in which the Village logo portion of the sign is mounted on a single wood post. This style is smaller and will be used in areas where the right-of-way is limited.

Each sign will have various landscaping features depending upon its location and amount of right-of-way.

The Village Board selected the entryway sign designs after reviewing the entryway signs of over 20 surrounding communities. Village officials hope that the entryway signs will enhance the Village's appearance and identity.



One of the new Village entryway signs is located on Irving Park Road just west of Wise Road.

Minute with the Mayor

Recently, I had the occasion to meet with a very special group of people who are members of an organization called "Rebuilding Together, with Christmas in April." Their mission statement states, "Spreading the spirit of volunteerism by partnering with the community to rehabilitate the homes of low-income residents, especially the elderly, disabled, or families with children so that they may continue to live in warmth, safety and independence."

Here are some facts about *Christmas in April*. *Christmas in April* is an annual one-day blitz to repair and rehabilitate the homes of the elderly and disabled. *Christmas in April* started in this area in 1992 and is a nonprofit, private organization and affiliate of the *National Christmas in April Program*.

Why is Christmas in April needed? Many of our neighbors cannot provide themselves even the basic necessities that we take for granted. The organization has put heat into homes, repaired

plumbing, and replaced kitchen appliances for senior citizens. They have painted homes inside and out; plastered ceilings and walls, replaced faulty locks, drafty windows, and unsafe electrical wiring. Over the past years, over 3,500 volunteers rehabilitated 130 homes.

Who is eligible for Christmas in April? Low income, elderly, and disabled homeowners, who are not able to do the work themselves, as well as nonprofit facilities, qualify for assistance.

How is a Christmas in April home selected? Various municipalities, churches, and community and senior organizations refer houses to *Christmas in April*. A professional home inspector or skilled trade person makes a work-scope visit. A board/committee ultimately makes the difficult determination as to whether the house not only meets eligibility but also is within the organization's ability to complete. Individual homeowners may request an application by letter or by telephone.

What are the responsibilities of the homeowner being helped? Homeowners who are able-bodied are expected to work alongside volunteers on *Christmas in April* Day. While that is not always possible, homeowners have found other special ways for making the volunteers feel welcomed and appreciated.

Who pays for Christmas in April? *Christmas in April* is a separate, nonprofit community-wide organization. The organiza-

tion receives funds from churches, businesses, corporate foundations, corporation clubs, and individuals. Everyone is welcomed and encouraged to participate in this activity of "neighbor helping neighbor." All funds received are fully tax deductible and go directly to *Christmas in April*.

Financial Report

Village Receives GFOA Budget Award

The Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) presented the Village of Hanover Park with the GFOA's *Distinguished Budget Presentation Award* for the 12th time.

The award represents a significant achievement by the Village and the commitment of Village staff to meet the highest principles of government budgeting. In order to receive the budget award, the Village had to satisfy nationally-recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how

well a budget serves as: a policy document, a financial plan, an

operations guide, and a communications device.

Fiscal Year 2002 Budget Highlights and New Water and Sewer Rates

The new fiscal year 2002 budget includes \$40,924,896 in revenues. This is 20.6% larger than last year's budget of \$33,933,930. Property taxes including general property taxes and special service area taxes total 19.1% of revenues. Water and sewer fees are the next largest single revenue item totaling 16.4% of revenues. Interfund transfers and the new general obligation bond issue total 10.4% and 9.8%, respectively. Other major revenue sources included in the budget are interest at 5.2%, sales tax at 5.3%, and state income tax at 6.8%. Another important revenue source comes from cash on hand. \$3,000,000 or 7.6% of total revenues are provided from cash reserves for the new budget. A new source of revenue not regularly seen in the Village's budget is that of a \$4,000,000 general obligation bond issue previously mentioned. The purpose of this bond issue is to provide

funding for the Evergreen water tank and the various projects concerning the widening of Lake Street.

New Water & Sewer Rates

The second year of a three-year water rate increase program is slated to begin July 1. Increases of approximately 5% will be assessed for all water and sewer rates for the customers of the Village's water-sewer systems. The reasons for these increases are to provide funds for water distribution and sewer collection improvements and to pay the City of Chicago a 4% increase in the cost of Lake Michigan water.

Property Tax Rate

Recognizing the effect on homeowners and senior citizens in the Village, the Board of Trustees has attempted to keep property taxes as low as possible. The increase this year will be less than 5%. Overall the Village's tax rate should be approximately \$1.44 for \$100 of

equalized assessed valuation. The owner of a \$150,000 home would be paying \$720 for Village services in property taxes in the coming year.

Major projects funded in the budget include \$650,000 for an aerial fire truck, \$2,000,000 for replacement of the Evergreen water tank, and several projects related to the Lake Street widening project. \$300,000 is slated for a new salt dome.

Spring Curb Appeal

Sign Regulation Reminders

Temporary Signs

- Signs may only be displayed on private property.
- Signs may not be attached to trees, utility poles, parked vehicles, fences, or roofs.
- Signs are not permitted in Village parkways (the area between the sidewalk and street).

Residential Garage Sale Signs

- Only one sign is permitted on the private property (not parkway) where the sale is located. If the property is on a corner lot, two signs may be displayed on private property, one facing each street.
- Signs may not exceed six square feet per side and four feet in height.
- Signs must indicate the address and dates of the sale.
- Off-site signs shall be permitted only on private property and only with the consent of the owner.
- Signs must be removed after the sale.

Residential Real Estate Signs

- Only one sign is permitted on the property (not parkway) being sold. If the property is a corner lot, two signs are allowed, one facing each street.
- The maximum size of each sign is six square feet.
- The sign must be removed within seven days of the closing.
- Realtors are allowed to place one open house sign at the nearest intersection to the property. The sign must be placed on private property, and permission of the property owner is required. Signs may only be displayed on Saturdays and Sundays between 12:00 noon and 6:00 PM.

Note: Permits are not required for garage sale and real estate signs. However, illegal signs will be removed and disposed of by Police Department personnel.

Remember To Water Your Trees

Trees planted within the last two years need plenty of water. If you have a new tree on your property or in the parkway in front of your home, please remember to water it regularly.

Help Prevent Sanitary Sewer Back-Ups

Sanitary sewer back-ups can be both costly and frustrating. Fortunately, there are some things you can do to minimize the possibility of back-ups in your home.

Sewer back-ups are usually caused by introducing materials or products into the sewer system that should be disposed of someplace else. These things cause blockages within your home sanitary service line or the Village's main line sewer system.

The products that cause problems most often include:

- *cooking grease,
- *garbage disposal by-products,
- *feminine hygiene products,
- *disposable diapers, and
- *other heavy paper products.

Please follow the manufacturer's suggestions for disposal to reduce the possibilities of sewer back-ups and their associated costs. If you have questions regarding your sewer service line, call Joe Romero at 630-372-4440.

If you are experiencing a problem with your sewer line, call the Public Works Department during regular working hours at 630-372-4440 or

the Police nonemergency number at 630-372-4400 after hours and on weekends. A service representative will be dispatched to check the Village's main line sewer system. If the main line is clear, you will be advised to contact a plumber.

Sump Pumps

Sump pumps collect the ground water and pump it away from the house. The sump pump should discharge onto the ground. **It is illegal to have the sump pump connected to the sanitary sewer.**

The sump pump discharge pipe must extend well beyond the house, be directed to the downstream end of the lot, and reach no closer than three feet from the property line. The sump pump discharge should not cause a nuisance on a neighbor's property.

Downspouts

Downspouts must be directed away from the house and generally point toward the front or rear yards. It is important to keep downspout water away from the foundation. Downspout extensions are an easy first step to direct water away from the foundation.

Engineering News

Village Sidewalk & Fence Program

As a continuation of the Village's ongoing arterial fence program, a new sidewalk and an eight-foot high cedar board-on-board fence will be constructed this year on the east side of Barrington Road from Walnut to Maple Avenue. Sidewalk will also be added along Barrington Road from Laurel to Sycamore near the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) ball fields. The five-foot wide sidewalk will provide pedestrian access along Barrington Road.

In addition, another fence will be constructed along the north side of Schick Road from Bell to County Farm Road. The contract for these two combined projects was awarded to Luava, Inc. for approximately \$140,000. It is anticipated that the construction will start mid-June.

Lake Street Closings

Please be aware... the Lake Street bridge reconstruction continues and will involve *total closure of Lake Street* on weekends throughout the summer. Beginning mid-June, Lake Street will be closed from 7:00 PM on Fridays until 5:00 AM on Mondays on intermittent weekends as needed. The reconstruction project is expected to be complete in April, 2002.

Barrington Road Resurfacing

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) plans to resurface Barrington Road from Higgins Road to Lake Street at the end of the summer.

Community Development News

Village Board Approves “Village Center” TIF District

At their May 3rd meeting, the Village Board approved those ordinances necessary to create a special tax increment finance (TIF) district in the “Village Center” Area. The Village Center area is generally located along Lake Street, Barrington Road, and County Farm Road and contains over 220 total acres. The TIF program is a method of financing improvements necessary to develop and redevelop properties in certain designated areas. **TIF districts do not raise property taxes.** Rather, TIF districts allow Village direction and coordination of public improvements to encourage private investment.

The Village Center TIF will allow the community to create a central focal point including a new mixed-use commercial and residential development in the Lake Street/Barrington Road area that will be oriented to the Metra commuter station. The commercial and residential development that will make up a substantial portion of the site will be designed to encourage pedestrian access and present

a distinctive image and character for the Village Center. As well, new business park development is proposed for the southern part of the TIF Area, which is south of Devon Avenue and west of County Farm Road.

The Village expects to receive the following benefits from the new Village Center Area development:

- A newly-created and vital community center area that effectively serves as Hanover Park’s center for business and civic activities in a transit-oriented development environment;
- Strengthened nonresidential tax base for affected taxing agencies;
- Improved property tax balance between residential and non-residential properties (which will benefit existing homeowners); and
- Elimination of problem conditions in the TIF Area as well as general physical improvement and upgrading of properties.

The Village eagerly anticipates new development within the Village Center TIF Area!

Hanover Garden Center Renovations Planned

Owners of the Hanover Garden Center (7300 Barrington Road) plan to improve this four-store shopping center during the summer of 2001 with major renovations! Proposed upgrades include completely new exterior walls, a new parking lot layout, and new landscaping. The parking lot will be connected, with two new

driveways, to the adjacent Walgreen’s at the southwest corner of Irving Park Road and Barrington Road.

The Village eagerly anticipates these improvements as they will further upgrade the appearance of the Irving Park Road/Barrington Road intersection!

EDC Business Breakfast

The Village’s Economic Development Committee (EDC) has scheduled a breakfast event for local commercial businesses. The event is scheduled for Thursday, June 28 at 8:00 AM at the Village Hall, 2121 W. Lake Street. The EDC hopes that the Business Breakfast will give businesses the opportunity to learn more about what is happening in the Hanover Park community.

Village Requires Licensed Contractors

Alert to residents hiring contractors: The Village requires ALL contractors performing work at your home to be licensed, registered, and bonded with the Village Clerk’s Office BEFORE they can start any project. A permit is also required before work begins. An exception to this would be for siding, fascia, gutters, door and window *replacement* (no change in size of windows or doors), or landscaping work. The permit should be posted in a window facing the street when work has begun. For any questions, please call the Community Development Department at (630) 372-4260.
