

## Youth, Minority and Humanitarian Award Nomination Deadline Is December 20

The Village of Hanover Park is seeking candidates for three award categories: Youth of the Year, Humanitarian of the Year, and Minority Scholarship.

**The Youth of the Year Award**, which includes a \$1,000 scholarship, honors an individual who positively reinforces the outstanding qualities of our young people. The recipient must be a high school senior (Class of 2003). In addition, this year two \$500 scholarships will be awarded to two runners up. Applicants, who must be Hanover Park residents, must write a one-page essay and include a letter of recommendation. Letters may not be submitted by family members

**Two Minority Scholarships** will be awarded to two high school seniors (Class of 2003). The \$1,000 scholarships must be applied to undergraduate studies. Applicants must be residents of the Village of Hanover Park and must write a short essay describing their community involvement and educational goals. Two letters of recommendation are also required.

**The Humanitarian Award** will be presented to a Hanover Park resident who has demonstrated a commitment to the community, the spirit of multicultural fellowship, or a philanthropic effort worthy of commendation. Nominees should be those whose unselfish efforts benefit the Hanover Park community at large, and who exemplify the highest ideals of humanitarianism.

## New Street Lights Enhance Safety In Neighborhoods, Schools

Five new street lights are improving both aesthetics and safety in several neighborhood locations, with special attention being given to providing additional lighting near three neighborhood schools.

The new street lights are located at Barrington Road and Yorkshire Drive, west side of County Farm Road south of Stearns Road, on Laurel Avenue at Parkwood School, on Laurie Lane at Einstein School, and on Arlington Drive East at Spring Wood Middle School.

The three street lights near schools were installed at the specific direction of the Village Board. At their January 2002 transportation post-board workshop, Board members specified the need for additional lighting near schools.

Two additional streetlights will be installed within the next few weeks -- one on Kingsbury Drive and one on Bristol Lane. Funding for these two street lights is being provided by the Police Department Block Grant.

## Minute with the Mayor . . .

The world as we know it has changed greatly since September 11, 2001. Today, as never before, it is incumbent on all government officials to assure that appropriate information provided to us is shared with you. This is not meant to cause any undue stress, but rather to ensure that you have the information that explains the risk levels and recommended actions if and when we are notified of potential risks. I hope you find this information useful.

### **RISK OF ATTACK AND RECOMMENDED ACTIONS**

#### **RED: SEVERE RISK OF ATTACK**

- Listen to radio/TV for current information/instructions
- Be alert to suspicious activity and report it to proper authorities immediately
- Contact business/school to determine status of work/school day
- Adhere to any travel restrictions announced by local governmental authorities
- Be prepared to shelter in place or evacuate if instructed to do so by local governmental authorities
- Discuss children's fears concerning possible/actual terrorist attacks

#### **ORANGE: HIGH RISK OF ATTACK**

- Be alert to suspicious activity and report it to proper authorities
- Review disaster plan with all family members
- Exercise caution when traveling
- Have shelter to place materials on hand and understand procedure
- Discuss children's fears concerning possible terrorist attacks
- If a need is announced, donate blood at designated blood collection center

#### **YELLOW: ELEVATED RISK OF ATTACK**

- Be alert to suspicious activity and report it to proper authorities
- Ensure disaster supplies kit is stocked and ready
- If not known to you, contact school to determine their emergency notification and evacuation plans for children
- Develop alternate routes to/from school/work and practice them

#### **BLUE: GUARDED RISK OF ATTACK**

- Be alert to suspicious activity and report it to proper authorities
- Review stored disaster supplies and replace items that are outdated
- Develop an emergency communication plan that all family members understand
- Establish an alternate meeting place away from home with family/friends

#### **GREEN: LOW RISK OF ATTACK**

- Obtain a copy of "Terrorism: Preparing for the Unexpected" brochure from your local Red Cross Chapter
- Develop a personal disaster plan and disaster supplies kit using Red Cross brochures "Your Family Disaster Plan" and "Your Family Disaster Supplies Kit"
- Take a Red Cross CPR/AED and first aid course

Your local American Red Cross chapter has materials available to assist you in developing preparedness capabilities.

## Watches, Warnings & Advisories: They're All Part of the Winter Vocabulary

Heat advisories are long gone, and in their place we may soon be hearing winter storm warnings, snow and ice advisories, and cautions about frostbite and frozen batteries. In short, it's winter in Chicago.

With that in mind, it's time to brush up on winter words that we need to know:

### Watches, Warnings, Advisories & More

- ❑ **Winter Storm Watch** – Indicates severe winter weather such as heavy snow or ice is possible within the next day or two. Prepare now!
- ❑ **Winter Storm Warning** – Indicates severe winter weather conditions are occurring, imminent or highly likely. Stay indoors!
- ❑ **Heavy Snow Warning** – Snowfall of six inches or more.
- ❑ **Ice Storm Warning** – Heavy accumulations of ice will create extremely dangerous travel and damage trees and power lines.
- ❑ **Blizzard Warning** – Snow and strong winds will combine to produce blinding snow, near zero visibility, deep drifts, and life threatening wind chill.
- ❑ **Winter Weather Advisory** – Indicates winter weather conditions will cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous...especially to motorists. Use caution.
- ❑ **Snow Advisory** – Snowfall of three to five inches.
- ❑ **Wind Chill Advisory** – Dangerous wind chills of 35 degrees below zero or colder.
- ❑ **Blowing/Drifting Snow Advisory** – Poor visibility and hazardous driving conditions.

## Be a friend to a fire hydrant

If there is a fire hydrant in front of or adjacent to your home, please keep it clear of snow so it will be easier for the Fire Department to locate and use.



## Keep kids away from snow piles at the curb

For safety's sake, children should not be permitted to play on or near the piles of snow near the curb. The snow plow drivers may not be able to see children who are hidden by a snowdrift.

## De-icing Truck Joins Village's Snow Fighting Fleet

A new piece of equipment that will help provide safer streets this winter is now part of the Village's snow fighting fleet

That equipment, pictured to the right, is a 500 gallon tank with spray bars that will spray a salt brine mixture onto specific streets and intersections twice per week during the winter months. As snow begins to fall, the salt brine will melt the snow before it can form an icy bond with the pavement. This will get the melting process underway even before the Village's salt trucks are mobilized.

## Enjoy Your Christmas Tree . . . Then Recycle It on December 28 or January 4

Christmas trees will be recycled throughout the Village on Saturday, December 28 and Saturday, January 4. Place your Christmas tree in the parkway and follow these simple guidelines:

- ❑ Do not put trees in plastic bags -- they will not be recycled
- ❑ Remove all decorations including lights, garland, tinsel, and metal (such as nails). Be sure to remove the stand.
- ❑ Dispose of artificial or natural wreaths in the regular household garbage.
- ❑ Do not place artificial trees at the curb for recycling.



We ask for your cooperation in setting your tree out **ONLY** on the dates of December 28 and January 4. However, if you miss the special collection dates, BFI Waste Systems or your scavenger will collect Christmas trees along with your regular garbage and refuse collection.

This service is also being provided to the homeowner associations that are not regularly serviced by BFI Waste Systems.

## Be a Winter-Wise Driver

Winter is fast approaching, so now is the time to make sure that your vehicle is properly winterized. Winter weather requires a vehicle that is in peak operating condition, and a driver who is alert for the challenges and dangers that come with inclement weather. The National Weather Service offers the following suggestions:

1. Have your vehicle checked and serviced. This includes, but is not limited to, checking the battery, antifreeze level, wipers and fluid, lights, heater, brakes and oil level.
2. Make sure that there is enough tread on the vehicle's tires for safe driving and stopping.
3. Maintain at least a half tank of gas during the winter driving season.
4. Dress warmly, with several layers of clothing, to help ward off hypothermia.
5. Always drive at a safely reduced speed when ice and snow are present on the roadway.



If trapped in your vehicle during a severe winter storm, stay in the car, unless help is visible within 100 yards. You may become disoriented and lost in blowing snow. Run the car's engine 10 minutes every hour and beware of carbon monoxide poisoning.

# 'Sno Foolin': Winter's Coming and We're Ready!

As every Chicagoan knows, the next several months will bring the ever-present threat of heavy snowfalls, icing conditions, and generally less-than-ideal driving conditions. Whatever the weather brings, you will be ready if you SAVE & POST this information sheet for easy reference through the winter months.

## Winter parking regulations:

On-street parking is not permitted after a snowfall of two or more inches until the street has been plowed. You can help the snow plowing crews get the streets plowed as quickly as possible by keeping parked cars off of the street while snow removal operations are in progress. In the interest of public safety and making the roads passable as quickly as possible, **illegally parked cars will be ticketed and towed.**

## Plowing priorities

- Main streets are cleared first, secondary (residential) streets are second, and cul-de-sacs are cleared last.
- Intersections are salted after snowplowing. In cases of severe icing, intersections and straight sections of road are salted immediately.
- Snowplow drivers are instructed to avoid stopping and talking to residents.



## Remember to shovel the sidewalk, too

Many neighborhood children walk to school and need to be able to use the sidewalks, so Village ordinance requires sidewalks to be cleared within two hours following a snowfall of two inches or more. Thanks for helping to keep children safe by not forcing them to walk in the street where they could find themselves in danger from vehicle traffic. Your help is much appreciated.

## And shovel the end of your driveway last

There is no place, except along the edge of the curb -- and therefore across the end of your driveway -- for the snow plow to push the snow. Save yourself both time and aggravation by waiting until AFTER the snow plow has made its final pass on your street to shovel the last 5 feet of your driveway.



## Snowy day garbage reminders

If possible, please wait until about two hours prior to pickup time to put your garbage out and place them close to the driveway to reduce the risk of the containers becoming snow covered by the plows.

## Avoid Frozen water pipes



- When inside plumbing is on an outside wall, let the faucet drip slightly during very cold nights.
- If the water meter is located near a broken or cracked window, fix the window immediately.
- Don't turn the thermostat down drastically when taking a winter vacation.
- Ask the Village to shut off your water if you're moving and the house will be vacant.
- When thawing frozen pipes, leave the faucet on. This allows the ice and water to pass through as the pipe thaws.





The Hanover Park Fire Department teamed up with Rosati's Pizza to give five local families free pizzas on the night of October 25, as part of National Fire Prevention month.




If the residence did not have a functioning smoke detector, the resident had to pay for the pizza, but was given a free smoke detector by the Fire Department.

Of the nine residences visited, five had smoke detectors that were functioning properly; four had inoperable smoke detectors.

# Keep Your Holiday Festive and Fire-Safe

The holiday season is a wonderful time for family get-togethers, festive foods, gifts, glad tidings ... and fires. Candles, holiday trees, cozy fires in the fireplace, and festive lighting indoors and out are all sources of a potential fire. The Hanover Park Fire Department offers the following tips to keep in mind when decorating for the holidays to help ensure that you and your family have a safe, enjoyable holiday season.



- ❑ Choose a fresh tree. The branches should bend easily and not break. You can test the tree's freshness by bouncing the trunk on the ground two or three times; only a few needles should fall off.
- ❑ Cut two inches off of the tree's base before placing it in the stand. This opens up the tree's pores which will help it absorb more water.
- ❑ Use a stand that holds plenty of water, and put the tree in the stand as soon as possible. Water the tree daily. A six foot


tree will use one gallon of water every two days.

- ❑ Place the tree away from any wood stove, fireplace, heater or heat register, all of which will dry the tree out. A dried out tree poses a serious fire hazard.
- ❑ Make sure the tree is not blocking an exit. This includes both doorways to another room as well as a doorway to outside.
- ❑ If possible, place the tree close to an electrical outlet so extension cords will not be needed.
- ❑ Use only lights in perfect condition; lights with frayed or worn cords should be thrown out immediately. Use only UL approved lights with no more than three light strings plugged together.
- ❑ If you must use extension cords for tree lighting, make sure they are heavy duty extension cords.
- ❑ Remember to unplug your tree before going to bed or leaving the house.
- ❑ Never use candles for tree lights -- the fire potential is much too great.
- ❑ Keep presents away from direct contact with the tree lights.
- ❑ When tree needles begin to fall this is a warning sign and the tree should be removed from inside the home.
- ❑ Never burn your tree in your fireplace after the holiday season.

## Keep the Home Fires Burning Safely

Have your chimney or wood stove inspected and cleaned yearly by a certified chimney specialist.

- Clear the area around the hearth of debris, decorations, and flammable materials.
- Always use a metal mesh screen. Leave glass doors open while burning a fire.
- Install stovepipe thermometers to help monitor flue temperatures.
- Keep air inlets on wood stoves open and never restrict air supply to fireplaces.
- Use fire-resistant materials on walls around wood stoves.
- Never use flammable liquids to start a fire.
- Build small fires that burn completely and produce less smoke.
- Never burn cardboard boxes, trash, or debris in your fireplace or wood stove.
- Never leave a fire in a fireplace unattended. Extinguish the fire before going to bed or leaving the house.



## POLICE DEPARTMENT RECEIVES \$13,434 IN 2002 BLOCK GRANT MONEY

The Hanover Park Police Department was awarded \$13,434 in 2002 Community Block Grant funds, with a Village match of \$1,493 for a total of \$14,927. The grant money is earmarked for two special projects this year — two streetlights for the area of Kingsbury and Bristol, and communications equipment to further enhance the capabilities of the Police Department's Incident Command Vehicle.


