

Hanover Park Remembers 9-11 With Dedication of Freedom Way



The Village of Hanover Park honored and remembered the heroes of 9-11 as well as the men and women of the armed forces at the Honorary "Freedom Way" Dedication and 9-11 Remembrance Ceremony on September 11, 2003 at the Mallard Lake Bike Path Trailhead parking lot.

At the September 4, 2003 Board Meeting, the Village President and Board of Trustees approved a Resolution renaming Greenbrook Boulevard as honorary "Freedom Way". It was the culmination of the Village Board's vision from December 2001, when Board members decided to establish a Patriotic Banner Program and create a "Freedom" theme along the Greenbrook Boulevard corridor. The program celebrates the four freedoms: Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Worship, Freedom from Want and Freedom from Fear. Greenbrook Boulevard was renamed as honorary "Freedom Way" as a way to publicly and permanently recognize the sacrifices of Village residents who have served our country to preserve these freedoms. Although the street will still officially be known as Greenbrook Boulevard, brown signs hung on street poles will proclaim it as Freedom Way.

The members of the Freedom Way Ad Hoc Committee are now in the early planning stages for a Memorial Day 2004 event to honor those who have served our country to preserve our freedoms. Minute with the Mayor . . .

This month we lost a wonderful friend of the Village of Hanover Park. Former Chief of Police Robert Sauer passed away peacefully at the Del Nor Community Hospital in Geneva, IL. His police career spanned 41 years.

He was sworn in as an Elmhurst Police Officer on April 29, 1962 and was promoted to the rank of sergeant in 1968. He was selected to attend the Law Enforcement Long Course at Northwestern University. In May of 1974 he was appointed as the Chief of Police for the City of Bartlett. In May of 1976 he was appointed as the Chief of Police for the Village of Hanover Park where he served for 16 years. While in Hanover Park he pioneered the Explorer Program to promote youth involvement in law enforcement. He was responsible for the implementation of the enhanced 911 system. He continued his career as Deputy Chief of Police with the Cook County Sheriffs Department. In 1996, he accepted a position with the State Police as the Assistant Bureau Chief of Field Services. His son, Jeffery, followed in his father's footsteps and is a Police Officer in Aurora. His son Daniel is a Marine veteran of Desert Storm. Robert is survived by his loving wife of 37 years Marjorie, three children, Jeffrey Sauer of Aurora, Daniel (Cathy) Sauer of Massachusetts and Laura (Dennis) Fiala of North Aurora, six grandchildren and his beloved Labrador Retriever, Casey.



New Health Clinic

The Brother Philip Kennedy Family Health Center is available to those who require health care services and do not have insurance. The Brother Philip Kennedy Family Health Center is located at 6620 N. Barrington Road in Hanover Park. This outreach clinic is sponsored by the Alexian Brothers Hospital Network. The Center provides care to individuals who reside in a specific area, which covers part of Hanover Park and Schaumburg Townships. Medical care is provided by a Family Health Physician. The Center is designed to offer medical care for those who do not have health insurance and whose income falls within 200% of the poverty level. Sister Cities Delegation Visits Cape Coast

This summer, members of Hanover Park's Sister Cities Committee, led by Deputy Village President Robert Packham, attended the 12th annual U.S.-African Sister Cities



Conference in Accra, the capitol of Ghana, West Africa. Members had the pleasure of meeting Mary Carlin Yates the United States Ambassador to Ghana. The conference included workshops and

seminars covering trade, economic development, municipal governance, health care and HIV/AIDS awareness.

A key participant in the conference was Dr. K. Bentsi-Enchill of our Sister City of Cape Coast, who is chairman of the Cape Coast Sister Cities Organization. He and Linda Packham, Hanover Park Sister Cities Committee Chairperson, spent many enjoyable hours talking, exchanging ideas, and discussing ways to make our city-to-city relationship more effective. Meeting face-to-face was especially exciting, after communicating by email for many years!

On the final day of the conference, the Hanover Park contingent was invited to the Presidential Palace to meet with the Honorable John Agyekum Kufour, President of Ghana. He was involved in brokering the subsequently successful cease fire in Monrovia, Liberia. He took the time to meet with and inform the group that he places great importance on the peaceful role of Sister Cities.

Following the Conference, the Hanover Park delegation traveled 90 miles along the coast to spend a week visiting our Sister City of Cape Coast. The group included Dr. Bentsi-Enchill, Frank and Adelaide Grant-Aquah, Hanover Park residents and Cape Coast natives, who served as official guides. We attended social events, conferred with Mayor Arafat Nuhu, met with officials of the Cape Coast Municipal Assembly, bartered in the open air markets and met people from all segments of Ghanaian society.

A special meeting was requested and hastily arranged by the Cape Coast Traditional Council of Chiefs to meet with Mr. Grant-Aquah and Deputy Village President Packham, representing the Delegation. The Council of Chiefs wanted to inform us of their collective desire to take a more active role in our Sister Cities relationship. "These gentlemen are among the very first to know whenever something good or



bad happens among the populace," Packham said. "They are highly respected by everyone and take their roles very seriously. We certainly welcome their participation and look forward to their input as we move ahead."

One of the highlights of our trip was a visit to the Hanover Park Primary School. Students gave a rousing welcome including songs, dance routines and individual recitations. The Queen Mother of Cape Coast, a long time friend of Hanover Park, was there to greet us. The delegation recognized youngsters whose art works were displayed at the STAARS exhibit at Village Hall. The Packhams presented scholarship awards in honor of the school's founder, the late Mrs. Irene Johnson and former Village President Sonya Crawshaw, who was instrumental in making the Hanover Park - Cape Coast Sister Cities relationship a reality.

The Grant-Aquahs arranged for us to visit the rain forest at Kakum National Park. A series of seven long rope bridges suspended high above the forest floor provide a commanding view of the forest with its myriad shades of green. Dubbed "Indiana Jones Bridges" by Deputy Mayor Packham, the bridges accommodate one person at a time as they sway, creak and groan with each step. Having to gingerly cross each effectively took everyone's minds off the crowded social calendar and let them concentrate first on negotiating the bridges and then take in the natural beauty of the forest for a few very peaceful hours.



Everyone thoroughly enjoyed their brief stay in Ghana and came away with a new appreciation for Sister Cities. They arrived home with renewed energy, ready to pursue new projects with their Sister City counterparts and are already talking about a return visit in the future.

Six Suggestions to Keep From Becoming a Victim of Home Repair Fraud

The last hail storm caused extensive damage to both homes and vehicles. Residents whose homes need repairs must be careful when choosing a contractor. Be sure to check with the Village to determine if inspections and permits are required. Contact the Community Development Department at (630) 372-4260 with any questions related to building permits.

Please use extreme caution when confronted with the following warning signs of a potential scam:

▲ Door-to-door salespersons with no local connections who offer to do home repair work for substantially less than the market price.

▲ Solicitation for repair work from a company that lists only a telephone number or a post-office box number to contact, particularly if it is an out-of-state company.


▲ Contractors who fail to provide customers references when requested.

▲ Persons offering to inspect your home for free. Do not admit anyone into your home unless he/she can present authentic identification establishing his/her business status. When in doubt, do not hesitate to call the worker's employer to verify his/her identity.

▲ Contractors demanding cash payment for a job or who ask you to make a check payable to a person other than the owner or company name.

▲ Offers from a contractor to drive you to the bank to withdraw funds to pay for the work.

0% Interest Home Improvement Loans Available to Qualifying Residents

Qualified homeowners may be eligible for a 0% interest deferred loan up to a maximum amount of \$25,000 with no monthly payments as long as the homeowner lives in and retains title to the home.

The North West Housing Partnership will determine the amount of assistance the applicant is eligible for. These loans are part of the Cook County Community Development Block Grant Program and HOME Investment Partnerships Program, which are funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The money can be used to correct problems that make your house either unsafe or cause it to deteriorate. Loans are not made for interior or exterior decorating. The following types of repairs can be covered: roofing, doors and windows, electrical, plumbing, heating, and weatherization.

To qualify for a loan at the minimum you must: live in the Cook County portion of Hanover Park, own and live in the home you wish to repair, not have the financial ability to pay for the repairs, and meet total family income requirements.

Village to Award Two \$1,000 Minority Scholarships



Helpful Hints for a Safe & Happy Halloween

Help keep your favorite ghosts and goblins safe this Halloween by reviewing these important safety rules with your children.

- ❑ NO candy should be eaten until it has been inspected by an adult.
- ❑ Discard any unwrapped items.
- ❑ Check all food wrappers for signs of tampering.
- ❑ Keep costumes simple. Costumes should be made of light, brightly colored or reflective material, so that your trick-or-treater can be easily seen at night. Costumes should not restrict either vision or movement.
- ❑ At least one person in the group should carry a flashlight while trick or treating.
- ❑ Trick or treat in groups whenever possible, accompanied by one or more adults.
- ❑ Instruct your children not to enter any home, and don't invite anyone else's child into your home.
- ❑ For safety's sake, trick or treat only at homes in your own neighborhood.
- ❑ Remind children to cross only at corners and to look both ways before crossing the street. Children should use sidewalks whenever possible, obey traffic lights, and walk – never run – across streets.

FINAL CURBSIDE BRUSH PICKUP OF THE YEAR BEGINS OCTOBER 6TH

All brush must be placed at the curb by 7:00 AM on the morning of your pick up. Brush can only be set out two days prior to 7:00 AM on your pick up day. Please do not put brush out after 7:00 AM on the first day of your collection cycle. Hold it for the next scheduled pickup. The Village incurs considerable cost returning to an area to collect brush set out after the first day of the collection cycle. It may take more than one day to pick up all the brush in a designated area. **NOTE:** BFI's final yardwaste pickup of the year is on November 29.

- October 6th:** Area 1: Streets north of Lake Street and west of Barrington Road.
October 13th: Area 2: Streets north of Lake Street and east of Barrington Road
October 20th: Area 3: Streets south of Lake Street and north of Lawrence Avenue
October 27th: Area 4: Streets south of Lawrence Avenue

WOOD CHIPS -- FREE FOR THE ASKING!

The Village will deliver loads of wood chips, a by-product of the Village's brush pickup program, to residents free of charge. Each load will average about four cubic yards - enough to fill an area six feet by six feet by three feet high (6' x 6' x 3"). The Public Works Department will deliver the wood chips and will dump them in the driveway only. Wood chips will not be dumped on driveway aprons, sidewalks, or lawns. Change Your Clock, Change Your Smoke Detector Batteries

Daylight savings time is going to change back to standard time at 2:00 AM on Sunday, October 26. That's the date that you need to make another change – a change that could save your life – by changing the batteries in your smoke detectors.

Nonworking smoke detectors disarm residents of the protective benefits which home fire safety devices were designed to provide. The most commonly-cited cause of nonworking smoke detectors: dead or missing batteries! Approximately 900 children die each year in home fires, and 80% of those deaths occur in homes without working smoke detectors.

Changing smoke detector batteries at least once a year is one of the simplest, most effective ways to reduce these tragic deaths or injuries. In fact, working smoke detectors reduce the risk of death or injury in home fires by nearly 50%.

The "Change your clock, change your battery" campaign urges you to change smoke detector batteries when changing clocks back to standard time each fall, this year on October 26th. It's a change that could save your life!



You could win a free pizza or free smoke detector on October 25. Here's how!



On Saturday, October 25, the Hanover Park Fire Department will team up with Rosati's Pizza to promote the "Change your Clock, Change your Battery" campaign.

From 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM firefighters will randomly follow a pizza delivery crew from Rosati's Pizza. If the residence has a functioning smoke detector, the residents will receive their pizza free of charge. If the residence has a smoke detector that is not functioning, or if there is no smoke detector at all, the residents will be given a new smoke detector from the Fire Department.

Fire Department Offers CPR & First Aid Classes
