2013 - Water Quality Report

Each year, your tap water is tested according to USEPA and state drinking water health standards. Our system vigilantly safeguards its water supply from Lake Michigan, and we are working hard to continue providing the best water possible. This report summarizes the quality of water that we provided last year and informs you of any concerns we are working on overcoming. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best allies.

The Village of Hanover Park uses ground water provided by four (4) wells drilled into the Cambrian Ordovician and the Illinois Prairie aquifers as an emergency water source. These wells provided only 1.8% of the total water consumed in the Village in 2013. Lake Michigan was the source of 98.2% of the Village's water supply.

Sources of Water - The sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and groundwater wells. Lake Michigan is a surface water supply.

As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it can pick up substances resulting from human activity or the presence of animals. The drinking water source is vulnerable to industrial waste and runoff from surrounding lands.

Possible contaminants consist of:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife;
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which may be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming;
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses;
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals,

which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and may also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic systems; and,

- Radioactive contaminants, which may be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons, such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants, can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline 1.800.426.4791.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, USEPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

2013 Source Water Assessments Village of Hanover Park

1.8% of Hanover Park's water is provided by ground water wells, which are not considered to be susceptible to contamination, based on criteria including monitoring at the wells, monitoring at entry points to the distribution system, and available hydrogeological data.

The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no

protection, only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois.

Chicago's off shore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet-weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract waterfowl, gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas and shoreline point sources due to the influx of groundwater to the lake.

Throughout history there have been extraordinary steps taken to assure a safe source of drinking water in the Chicagoland area, from the building of the offshore cribs and the introduction of interceptor sewers, to the lock-and-dam system of Chicago's waterways and the City's Lakefront Zoning Ordinance.

The city now looks to the recently created Department of Water Management, Department of Environment and the MWRDGC to assure the safety of the city's water supply. Water supply officials from Chicago are active members of the West Shore Water Producers Association. Coordination of water quality situations (i.e., spills, tanker leaks, exotic species, etc.) and general lake conditions are frequently discussed during the association's quarterly meetings. Also, Lake Michigan has a variety of organizations and associations that are currently working to either maintain or improve water quality.

One of the best ways to ensure a safe source of drinking water is to develop a program designed to protect the source water against potential contamination on the local level. Since the predominant land use within Illinois' boundary of Lake Michigan watershed is urban, a majority of the watershed protection activities in this document are aimed at this purpose.

Citizens should be aware that everyday activities in an urban setting might have a negative impact on their source water. Efforts should be made to improve awareness of storm water drains and their direct link to the lake within the identified local source water area.

A proven best management practice (BMP) for this purpose has been the identification and stenciling of storm water drains within a watershed. Stenciling along with an educational component is necessary to keep the lake a safe and reliable source of drinking water.

The City of Chicago provides treatment for the Village's Lake Michigan supply of water. Included in our report is the City of Chicago's 2013 Water Quality Date Report.

City of Chicago - Lake Michigan

Source Water Location

The City of Chicago utilizes Lake Michigan as its source water via two water treatment plants. The Jardine Water Purification Plant serves the northern area of the City and suburbs, while the South Water Purification Plant serves the southern areas of the City and suburbs. Lake Michigan is the only Great Lake that is entirely contained within the United States. It borders Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin, and is the second largest Great lake by volume with 1,180 cubic miles of water and third largest by area.

Susceptibility to Contamination

The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment of all surface water supplies in Illinois. Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet-weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract waterfowl, gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas and shoreline point sources due to the influx of groundwater to the lake.

2013 Voluntary Monitoring

The City of Chicago has continued monitoring for Cryptosporidium, Giardia and E.coli in its source water as part of its water quality program. To date, Cryptosporidium has not been detected in these samples, but Giardia was detected in 2010 in one raw lake water sample collected in September 2010.

Treatment processes have been optimized to provide effective barriers for removal of Cryptosporidium oocysts and Giardia cysts in the source water, effectively removing these organisms in the treatment process. By maintaining low turbidity through the removal of particles from the water, the possibility of Cryptosporidium and Giardia organisms getting into the drinking water system is greatly reduced.

In 2013, CDWM has also continued to monitor for hexavalent chromium, also known as chromium-6. USEPA has not yet established a standard for chromium-6, a contaminant of concern which has both natural and industrial sources.

Definitions and Abbreviations (relating to Pages 6 & 7)

Action Level (AL): Concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Action Level Goal (ALG): Level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. ALG's allow for a margin of safety.

Avg: Regulatory compliance with some MCLs are based on running annual average of monthly samples.

Date of Sample: If a date appears in this column, the Illinois EPA requires monitoring for this contaminant less than once per year because the concentrations do not frequently change. If no date appears in the column, monitoring for this contaminant was conducted during the Consumer Confidence Report calendar year.

Highest Level Detected: This column represents the highest single reading of a contaminant of all the samples collected in 2009.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): The highest level of a drinking water disinfection allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG): The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Range of Detections: This column represents a range of individual sample results from lowest to highest that were collected during the CCR calendar year.

TCR (Total Coliform Rule): Requires all public water supplies to monitor for the presence of total coliform in the distribution system.

Treatment Technique (TT): A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

nd: Not detectable at testing limits

n/a: Not applicable

Water Quality Data Table Footnotes**Turbidity**

Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system and disinfectants.

Unregulated Contaminants

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effects language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

Fluoride

Fluoride is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

Sodium

There is no state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials who have concerns about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician about the level of sodium in the water.

UNREGULATED CONTAMINANT MONITORING RULE II (UCMR II): Our water system was required to monitor for all contaminants required under the Unregulated Contaminant Monitoring Rule II (UCMR II). Began in 2009, monitoring under UCMR II was completed in 2011, with none of the contaminants detected. Lead and Copper

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. We are responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but we cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Grilling Safety Tips

- Grills should only be used outdoors.
- Place grills away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Let coals cool before disposing in a metal container.
- When using a propane grill check the gas tank hose for leaks each year before using. If you smell gas while cooking immediately step away from the grill and call the Fire Department. Do not move the grill.

Open Burn Ordinance

Except as provided herein, it shall be unlawful to burn anywhere in the Village: garbage, refuse, landscape waste or lumber that is not clean, as defined in Section 66-19.

Burning is permitted in an outdoor fireplace or cooking unit (barbeque grill) only if:

1. The fuel used is charcoal, natural or propane gas, dry-seasoned firewood, clean lumber, or a manufactured fire log.
2. The fireplace or cooking unit is under the supervision of an adult at all times during use.
3. The fire shall be entirely extinguished prior to leaving the fireplace or cooking unit unattended.
4. The manufacturer's installation, operating, and safety instructions shall be followed.
5. The fireplace shall be located at least ten feet from the nearest structure which is not on the same property as the fireplace.
6. The fire shall be maintained in such a manner as to minimize the generation of smoke, fumes, fly ash, or soot which shall not cause a nuisance to neighbors.
7. All fires in a fireplace are prohibited during the hours of midnight and 6:00 a.m.
8. Fire, police, and code enforcement officials are authorized to order the extinguishment or extinguish burning in violation of this section.

Open burning is allowed for special requests by school, governmental, and other institutions by permit issued by the Village Manager provided that it shall not be detrimental to the public's health and safety in the Village.

Weed & Tall Grass Abatement Ordinance

Tall grass and weeds in excess of eight inches is a violation of the Village of Hanover Park Municipal Code Chapter 54 Article V. The Code Enforcement Unit is responsible for abatement of tall grass and weeds of which the CEO's and the Appearance Officer enforce at residences and commercial properties in violation. During the spring and summer months tall grass and weed cases are very common throughout the Village due to rain and other conditions conducive to accelerated growth of grass and weeds.

Be proactive and cut your lawns to avoid being issued a notice to abate. If a resident does not remedy the problem within the amount of time written on the notice to abate, the contracted firm hired by the Village to cut the grass of properties in violation, will do it. The owner of the property will then be billed to pay for the contractors services to cut their lawn.

New Overnight Parking Enhancement

Effective May 1, 2014, residents and visitors who request permission to park a vehicle on the street within the Village of Hanover Park between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. will do so by using any computer, smartphone, tablet or other mobile device.

To access the night parking data base, residents or visitors will visit the Village website at <http://www.hpil.org/Services/Police/Night-Parking.aspx> and complete the required information to submit their request for permission to park. The individual will be sent an email receipt confirming or denying whether the vehicle has been given permission to park on the street. The ordinance and restrictions are posted on the website.

The Police Department will no longer accept phone calls from citizens to receive permission to park overnight on the street and will refer those who do call for permission, to an automated phone message providing the caller with the information necessary to access the on-line data base.

Those that do not have access to the Internet and would like to request permission to park on the street overnight will have to come to the Hanover Park Police Department Headquarters at 2011 Lake Street, Hanover Park to complete a Night Park Permission Form. Once completed, the form will be provided to a clerk at the Police Desk, who will enter the information into the data base and determine whether or not the requester has permission to park overnight on a Village street.

On May 18-21, Mayor Craig, Director of Community and Economic Development Govind, and Village Planner Bowman attended the ICSC RECon (International Council of Shopping Centers Real Estate Conference) in Las Vegas, Nevada. This convention offered an unparalleled opportunity to meet with developers, brokers, as well as retailers face-to-face, at one venue, discuss development opportunities, status/renewal of leases, and potential business recruitment.

The Village shared a booth provided by Choose DuPage with other neighboring municipalities to have a professional and attractive space to hold meetings for a low cost and time investment.

Using a multi-pronged approach for recruiting new businesses to fill our vacant space and developers for available land/sites, staff pursued emerging retailers/businesses, as well as developers, brokers, and property owners to discuss specific potential for these properties and build an understanding of the Village's overarching goals.

Overall, there was a positive feeling among businesses and developers at the conference. There was more activity and discussion about business expansion than in past years. However, many corporate real estate representatives shared that while they want to continue expanding in the Chicago region, they first will need to recruit new franchisees (local business owners) and developers to open businesses.

Staff has begun following up with the connections made at the conference for further dialogue and will continue to pursue leads for development/redevelopment as well as business recruitment.
